The following new books have been added to the public library shelves.  
DeWitt—Progressive movement. "Understanding by 'progressive' the abolition of corruption, control by the many rather than by the few, and the extension of the functions of government. The author gives briefly the general aspects of the history of the progressive movement, then traces at some length its development in each of the five largest political parties, and finally writes of its expression in reforms in nation, state and city. Written sympathetically, but with restraint.

Job—Propagation of wild birds. "A manual of applied ornithology, treating of practical methods of propagation of quail, grouse, wild turkey, pheasants, partridges, pigeons and doves, and of attracting and increasing wild birds in general, including song birds. Contains a remarkable amount of useful information on habits of birds, diseases, food care, dangerous pests, nesting boxes, both for the bird lover and those wishing to do business on a commercial scale. Very attractive illustrations."

MacGregor—Book of thrift. "Terse advice, illustrative stories, and quotations which should be of practical help and inspiration to persons on small salaries, housewives, parents who would teach their children to save, and to all small investors. While a great deal of the matter has been prepared especially for the book, it consists in the main of a series of "talks on thrift" prepared by the author for the savings bank section of the American bankers' association."

McKoon—Fire prevention. "Were every housekeeper to fully appreciate the importance of taking such precautions as described in this book, the annual fire loss per capita in this country might not be, as it is at present, several times larger than that of any European country. The average citizen may think it is not intended for him, but he will be mistaken, as he usually is when he thinks that, for the first page states without qualification that the fire problem is "up to the owners and occupants."

Mackay—How to produce children's plays. "The object of this book," says the author in her first chapter, "is to tell in the simplest possible manner what to do and what not to do in the producing of plays for children. It is for the school child, not the stage child, that this book is intended; for the teacher and drama enthusiast rather than the professional producer." She first gives a brief history of the development of child drama. Following this are chapters on child player and child audience, how to produce children's plays; play analysis for children; and on costumes, scenery, properties, music, etc. Lists of plays suitable for public schools, settlements for outdoor occasions, holidays, and so on, complete in one volume.

Morris—Doctors versus folk. "A look back over thirty years of experience in the medical profession furnishes the writer with excellent material which he utilizes after the manner of the genial essayist and philosopher as well as the man of scientific attainments. Young doctors will find Dr. Morris's chapters full of helpful suggestions about what to avoid as well as what is worth a struggle to attain.

Sharpless—American college. "Study of the aims and methods of the smaller American college as distinguished from the large university. Plain in style but clear in statement, and a real contribution from a point of view not often heard."

Thorpe—Coming Newspaper. "The material in this book was prepared upon assignment of the editor, the professor of journalism in the University of Kansas who had obtained, by means of a questionnaire sent to a thousand men and women in public and private life, suggestions as to the most vital problems connected with journalism today. The chapters are written by men of wide journalistic experience and discuss the latest methods and ethics of newspaper making, news-gathering and handling, advertising, circulation, administration, and editorial direction."

Towns—Habits that handicap. "Shows the manner in which the drug habits are formed, offers important suggestions for handling of the entire question of habit forming drugs, and points a way to help in individual cases. Includes in the discussion the alcohol and tobacco habits. Dr. Richard C. Cabot writes in the introduction, "I do not hesitate to say that he knows more about the alleviation and care of drug addictions than any other doctor that I have ever seen."

Webb—History of philosophy. "Rapid survey of the history of thought from the time of Plato to Herbert Spencer. The clarity of style, the absence of technicalities, the simplicity of expression, and the element of human interest, make it a specially good first book for the general reader."

Williams—Dainties for home parties. "The author has carefully prepared this book, based upon her knowledge and a wide experience, as an aid for those who, in entertaining, desire dishes attractive, appetizing, a little unusual and, withal, not too difficult to prepare. Contents: Beverages, pinches, cups, etc., bullion, consommé, and biogue, substantial, hot and cold; salad dressings, salads, sandwiches; cakes, ices, extras."

Brookman—Family expense account. Butterfield—Book of house plans. Cox—Artist and public. Dapp—Place of industries in elementary education.

## BILL FOR STANDING ARMY OF 145,000 IS TO BE RECOMMENDED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The house military committee voted to recommend a regular army of 145,000 after defeating Thom's plan for an army of 220,000 as General Wood advocated. The bill authorized a twenty million dollar appropriation for a nitrate plant, devoted to the manufacture of fertilizer during peace and munition manufacture in war times. It would be leased to a private concern during peace.
