GRAIN RANCHERS PAID MORE.

Laborers in Cotton States Got Less Reflecting Prices of Products.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Wages of farm laborers increased slightly in the leading grain states and remained stationary or declined slightly in the cotton states, according to figures by the department of agriculture. The changes are attributed to higher grain prices and lower cotton prices.

Wages of male farm laborers by the day increased about 1 per cent for the entire country. Scarcity of labor was not so marked as during previous years, it was stated.

The department's figures were based upon correspondents throughout the country.

Indicating something of the volume of mail handled by the Pendleton post office in the report of Postmaster T. J. Tweedy upon the count and weight of mail for six successive days, ending March 18. These reports are called for from time to time by the department in order to get a check upon the business of the office. The following is the postmaster's report:

Number of letters, cards and letter-size circulars delivered, 5178.

Number of parcels under four pounds weight, 429.

Number of pieces of all other classes of mail delivered, 4794.
