SOUNDS NOTE FOR PEACE.

(Continued from page one.)

"I am sure," said the president, "that the people of the United States would wish their government to move along these lines:

"First—Such a settlement with regard to their own immediate interests as the belligerents may agree upon. We have nothing material of any kind to ask for ourselves and are quite aware that we are in no sense or degree parties to the present quarrel. Our interest is only in peace and its future guarantee.

"Freedom of Seas Necessary.

"Second—An universal association of the nations to maintain the inviolate security of the highway of the seas for the common and unimpeded use of all the nations of the world and to prevent any war begun either contrary to treaty covenants or without warning and full submission of the causes to the opinion of the world—a virtual guarantee of territorial integrity and political independence."

The fundamentals of a lasting peace President Wilson said he believed were:

"First—That every people has a right to choose the sovereignty under which they shall live.

"Like other nations," the President said, "we have ourselves, no doubt, once and again offended against that principle when for a little while controlled by selfish passion, as our grander historians have been honorable enough to admit, but it has become more our rule of life and action.

"Rights of Weak Maintained.

"Second—That the small states of the world have a right to enjoy the same respect for their sovereignty and for their territorial integrity that great and powerful nations expect and insist upon.

"And, third, that the world has a right to be free from every disturbance of its peace that has its origin in aggression and disregard of the rights of people and nations."

OFFICIAL PROGRAM IS ARRANGED FOR ANNUAL EVENT AT PORTLAND.

Formal Opening of Festival Center Will Take Place on June 6; Queen and Retinue Will Visit City Hall and Thence to Center for Crowning Event.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 29.—(Special.)—The official program of the 1916 Rose Festival calls for hourly attractions the evening of June 6, and June 7, 8 and 9, the three days of the tenth annual June celebration. The biggest events of the festa have been arranged as follows:

June 6-7 to 11 P. M.

Formal opening of the 1916 Festival center, magnificent floral display to cover 30,000 square feet in park blocks.

Queen and retinue will visit City Hall and accompany Mayor Albee to festival center where crowning ceremonies will take place.

First illumination of Broadway, Court of Honor and Grand promenade.

Inspection of floral displays at festival center by queen and festival governors.

June 7, Opening Day Tenth Annual Rose Festival.

10 a. m.—Pageant of school children on Grand Avenue, (East Side) presenting historical procession in which 10,000 boys and girls will take part.

10 a. m.—Second annual Rose Festival shoot at Jenne station under auspices Portland Gun Club.

2 p. m.—Opening annual exhibition of Portland Rose Society.

2 p. m.—National Dedication Columbia river highway.

2 p. m.—Oregon State golf championships at Waverly Links.

2 p. m.—Concert festival center by official band.

9 p. m.—Brilliant fireworks spectacle on river presenting destruction of gunboat by submarine. Portland fireboats to take part in thrilling spectacle.

June 8, Second Day of Rose Festival.

9 a. m.—Tractor Demonstration.

10 a. m.—Second annual Rose Festival roller skating marathon in which 500 school boys will take part.

10:30 a. m.—Opening northwest retail harness and saddle manufacturers' convention.

2 p. m.—Annual floral parade featuring more than 600 florally decorated floats.

5 p. m.—Children's song and drill in which 5000 boys and girls will take part.

9 p. m.—Formal ball in honor of the queen and maids of honor, given by the Rosarians.

10 p. m. to midnight—Dancing at the festival center.

June 9, Closing Day of Tenth Annual Rose Festival.

10:30 a. m.—Military, fraternal and civic pageant.

1 p. m.—First annual Rose Festival regatta featuring races by speed boats. Fastest hydroplane boats in Oregon and Washington will compete.

3 to 5 p. m.—Chinese pageant and baby show at festival center.

8 p. m.—First annual Utelee procession, carnival feature to close tenth annual rose festival.

8 to 12 p. m.—Final illumination of city with dancing at festival center and band concerts to close celebration.

Fair Weather Being Promised for Week

NORMAL TEMPERATURES WILL PREVAIL ACCORDING TO FORECASTER.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—North Atlantic states: Local showers Sunday and probably Monday will be followed by generally fair weather until the close of the week; temperatures will average near or above the seasonal normal.

Middle Atlantic states: Local thunderstorms Sunday and probably Monday will be followed by generally fair weather during the remainder of the week; temperatures will be above the seasonal average.

South Atlantic and Gulf states: Generally fair weather and normal temperatures are probable except that widely scattered thunderstorms are likely during the first two days of the week.

Ohio Valley and Tennessee: Generally fair weather and normal temperatures are probable during the week.

Region of the Great Lakes: Partly overcast weather and moderate temperatures except that local showers are probable at the beginning of the week.

Upper Mississippi Valley and Plains states: Generally fair weather and moderate temperatures are probable during the next several days.

Rocky Mountain and Plateau Regions and Pacific states: Generally fair weather with normal temperatures are probable during the week.
