**ST. JOSEPH'S ENDS TERM AFTER MOST SUCCESSFUL YEAR**

COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES ARE HELD YESTERDAY AT THE ALTA THEATER.

Pleasing Program is Given and Large Crowd is Present to Enjoy it; Bishop O'Reilly Awards Diplomas and Delivers Address Which is Well Liked.

The commencement exercises of St. Joseph's Academy took place yesterday afternoon at the Alta Theater, marking the close of one of the most successful school years in the history of the institution.

As usual a most pleasing program was rendered, consisting of songs, accompanied by stringed instruments, instrumental selections, drills, recitations and an historical drama.

The scene of the drama was placed in the time of the earlier Roman Emperors. The title role, Patricia, was taken by Miss Nadyne Blakely in her usual pleasing manner. It is always a pleasure to listen to this talented young lady. Miss Daphne Belts also rendered her part, that of a Roman princess, in an excellent manner. Miss Rose Kilkenny was a delightful Empress and acted the character with fine expression. Miss Agnes Mettief took the part of the treacherous slave and acted it very well indeed. Many beautiful scenes were presented during the progress of the drama by the dancing slaves, led by Master Archibald Blakely; the Vestal Virgins with the Empress Augusta offering incense to the goddess Vesta; and a most touching one was shown in the death of Patricia, mourned over by the little blind girl, Melita. This part was taken by the little Mildred Gibson, who did her part as well as to bring tears to the eyes of many.

At the close of the program, His Lordship, the Right Reverend Bishop C. T. O'Reilly of Baker, awarded to Miss Mary Doherty a certificate for completing the commercial course and to thirty-two pupils Palmer and American penman diplomas. Bishop O'Reilly then delivered a most eloquent closing address.

He extolled the great work for education which St. Joseph's Academy has carried on for the past twenty-nine years in Pendleton, and the generous applause of the large audience testified that all present were in sympathy with his words of praise. He said the program rendered by the pupils was both beautiful in its selection and its rendition, the pleasing appearance of the children, their graceful performance of the parts assigned to them, the moral lessons of the play, all vouched for the high class of civic and religious education given to their pupils by the Sisters of St. Francis in St. Joseph's Academy in this city.

In the course of his remarks, the Bishop brought out two striking points, namely, the Catholic schools are neither established to uphold any particular creed nor to antagonize secular schools, and that the secular schools are indispensable to the State in training of the vast number of non-Catholic citizens.

"I believe," said Bishop O'Reilly, "there should be a unity in education as there is a unity in truth. And I believe that to be the true education which preserves this unity and has for its purpose the imparting of truth both of the natural and the supernatural order."

"Herein lies the philosophy of Catholic education—a philosophy as simple that one would think it quite unnecessary either to offer an explanation or defense of it. For one who believes in the existence of God—in His providence—in the love and interest He bears towards His children in this world, and the propriety of educating those children to know and love and serve Him must appeal as an essential factor in their training and development."

"But again, as we believe, to do our part in this world, to fulfill our obligations in society and as citizens, there is needed a knowledge of things secular, science exact and speculative, the truth and laws of nature, the facts and figures which by their acquisition fit the individual for the performance of his various duties. Hence the necessity of the best training in these things.

"This is the aim of the Catholic schools, to train the child in his duties to God, and to fit him for the

performance of his obligations of the highest citizenship.

"Such a program cannot be justly referred to as narrow and sectarian—a hostile to secular schools or to the spirit of the country or to the demands of an exalted patriotism. The very opposite is the truth. A religious school is not established to uphold a particular creed, for that creed must stand upon firmer foundations.

"It is not established to antagonize secular schools. These latter have their province. And considering the many who belong to no religion, and, too, considering the multiplicity of creeds, they are the best solution the state can offer for the training of its diverse groups of citizens.

"And it should not be forgotten that Catholics pay their taxes for the support of the public schools, and recognizing the American principle of 'no taxation without representation,' justly lay claim to a voice and a consideration in all that makes for the advancement of the state schools.

"The religious schools, instead of being opposed to the demands of patriotism, are, in fact, the promoters of that patriotism which springs from and is established in divine sanction and benediction.

"Every page of history bears evidence that they serve their country best who love and serve God most—who refuse to admit a divided allegiance—who remember the Gospel injunction that we should be subject to the powers that be, since all power comes from God.

"To you pupils of St. Joseph's Academy, I would say, be practical in your religious duties, be pronounced in your patriotism, honor God, serve your country, be just, be fair in your dealings with all.

"And all those duties, while springing from Christian teaching and exalted patriotism, will find their inspiration and their highest commendation in that religious training wherein you see the God of nations guarding and guiding the world's destinies."

"I am glad to see that in America there is that broad and tolerant spirit—that willingness to understand one another—that desire to be mutually helpful, which means so much for our Catholic schools and people, and could urge us all the more to work unitedly upon the dissipation of whatever prejudice or misunderstanding may still exist.

"Young ladies, who are about to leave the school, I wish you every success in the years to come, and I would say to you in conclusion: Go into the world with hearts throbbing with noble impulses, and inspired by the exalted ambitions for God and country, which have been fostered in the splendid institution where you had the good fortune to be educated. And when the years of your youth have slipped away, and the battle of life has left its scars on you, you will come back some day, and renewing the associations of former years within the walls of St. Joseph's Academy, recalling the memory of lessons you received there in virtue and science, fervently, honestly, and with your whole heart in your words, you will say in deepest gratitude—God bless you, dear old Alma Mater, God's best blessings must rest upon the work which this grand institution is doing in this community, and the noble cultured women whose lives are consecrated to that work. May your future greatness fully realize the golden promise of your youth. And when the future historian shall compile the annals of the growth of this progressive section of the fair state of Oregon, and shall record the various moral and intellectual forces which are shadowed in the horoscope of years, high up the pages of its splendor may there appear the name of St. Joseph's Academy, one of the

strongest factors for true education of mind and heart in Eastern Oregon."


