

### CIRCULAR SAYS STATE OF WAR NOW EXISTS

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, June 27.—General Nafarette, commander of the Mexican forces in the state of Tamaulipas, opposite here, calls on the Mexican people, through circulars, to arm themselves against the Americans, saying that a state of war exists between the two countries and that all Americans found armed in Mexico will be either killed or captured. At the same time he announces that all Americans in Tamaulipas not armed and pursuing peaceful occupations will be protected.

There are now in the United States 4,063,028 persons native to Germany, Austria and Turkey, and 6,885,324 native to the nations fighting in the opposing alliance.

Gregory to Get U. S. Supreme Court Seat.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—The nomination of Attorney-General Thomas Watt Gregory of Austin, Texas, to be appointed to the Supreme Court to succeed Justice Hughes, will be sent to the senate in the near future, according to reports here.

Mr. Gregory was nominated for his present position as attorney general by President Wilson on August 19, 1914, to succeed James C. McReynolds, who in turn was moved up to the supreme court bench.

Mr. Gregory won his recognition as assistant attorney general in charge of the dissolution suit against the New Haven railroad. Before that he was attorney for the state of Texas against the Water-Fierce Oil company and the Standard Oil company.

Mr. Gregory will be 53 years in November. He was born in Crawfordsville, Miss., and was graduated from the Northwestern Presbyterian university at Clarksville, Tenn., in 1882. He was a special student at the University of Virginia for a while and finally took his law degree at the University of Texas.

He was admitted to the bar in Texas in 1885 and began practice in Austin. From 1891 to 1894 he served as an assistant city attorney of Austin, declining in 1892 an appointment as assistant attorney general of the state.

He married Miss Julia Nolle of Austin in 1893. He is an intimate friend of Colonel E. M. House, of Justice McReynolds—his classmate and roommate at the University of Virginia—and of Postmaster General Burleson.

### BILLY CRAIG, WELL KNOWN INDIAN, DIES AT BROTHER'S HOME

PNEUMONIA IS CAUSE OF DEATH AFTER AN ILLNESS OF ABOUT 3 WEEKS.

William (Billy) Craig, the well known Cayuse Indian, died at the home of his brother, Joe Craig, upon the reservation yesterday afternoon, after an illness of some three weeks, during which time he suffered from pneumonia and its sequela. He was fifty years of age, and leaves four children, John, Isaac, Maud and Nellie, who are in the government school. He was divorced from his wife, Agnes, about a year ago.

Billy Craig was of royal blood on his mother's side, she having been the daughter of a Cayuse chief, while his father was Joseph William Craig, son of Col. William Craig, a Virginian who settled on the Nez Perce reservation many years ago, married a wife of that tribe, and who was so highly regarded by the Nez Perces that in their treaty, they insisted that a donation claim settled upon by him within their reservation, should be confirmed to him by the government. Col. Craig died in Idaho nearly forty years ago. His grandson, Joe Craig, is now the last of the name.

Billy Craig was of the Catholic faith, and will be buried today under the ministry of that church, at the cemetery of Saint Andrew's Mission.

### ATHLETIC GIRLS TO PLAY PICKED LOCAL TEAM AT BASEBALL

A picked Pendleton team will meet Carleton Athletic Girls at Round-Up Park on Thursday evening of this week in the first baseball game in which the female of the species has figured in Pendleton for many years.

Erdie Carleton, manager of the girls' team arrived yesterday and completed arrangements for the game.

Manager McGarrigle of the old Pendleton Bucks has agreed to raise a team and has picked upon such men as Peterson, Varian, Knight, Edwards and other well known tossers to assist him in upholding the honors of his sex.

The Carleton Athletic Girls are a San Francisco organization now touring Oregon. They have been winning the majority of their games, having taken two Sunday, one from Rufus in the morning by a score of 3 to 2 and in the afternoon beating Arlington 2 to 1 in 11 innings. With the exception of the battery all of the members of the team are girls.

The game will begin at 6 o'clock in the evening.

### JAPAN AND RUSSIA IN PACT

Agreement Being Concluded to Protect Interests in China.

TOKYO, June 26.—It is learned on good authority that Japan and Russia are making favorable progress toward the conclusion of an agreement for protection of their mutual interests in China. The understanding is based on the principle of preserving the integrity of China.

According to a published report the pending agreement contemplates a conservative, peaceful agreement between Japan and Great Britain. It might be termed a defensive alliance for the protection of the common interests of the two empires in Eastern Asia.

The foreign office thus far has made no statement on this subject.

### CONSENT OF PARENTS IS NOW UNNECESSARY

CHICAGO, June 27.—An army order received by local United States recruiting stations eliminates the necessity of parents' consent for enlistment of youths over 18 and under 21 in the regular army.

The Prune Crop Is Heavy. RIDDLE, Ore., June 27.—From present indications and according to County Fruit Inspector F. L. Straug, Riddle will see one of the largest prune crops she has had for many years. Every orchard, with two or three exceptions, is so heavily loaded that many limbs are breaking already.

Several new driers are being erected and Judge G. W. Riddle, who has a large steam prune drier, is almost doubling the capacity in preparation for the heavy harvest this fall.

Toy Pistol Costs Fines. VANCOUVER, Wash. June 26.—Francis Collins, 9-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. Collins, living on a farm near Shunahai, about 15 miles from here, was shooting paper caps in a toy pistol, in company with several other children.

When the supply of paper caps was exhausted, some child procured a dynamite cap. Frances is in St. Joseph's hospital here with the thumb and two fingers blown off her right hand.
