

MADRAS WOMAN FINDS SECRET OF FAST DYES
Product of Oregon Berries and Bark Said to Stand Color Test Without Failure.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Mrs. John McTearart of Madras, Ore., believes she possesses a valuable secret in a process of making dyes from berries, roots, bark and plants. She says she was informed by an expert of the Oregon Agricultural College that dyes made from the vegetable kingdom are not a success because they fade, but on following the directions for tests her colorings came out unspatched.

She forwarded to Congressman Sinnott a number of samples of cloth dyed in different colors from Oregon berries, roots and bark, requesting that tests be applied here by government experts. Mr. Sinnott will ask that the materials submitted be made the subject of the experiment.

TWO MEN TAKE 100 GERMAN PRISONERS

French Corporal Decorated by President for Brilliant Achievement.

PARIS, Aug. 8.—Corporal Gouteaubier, of the French light infantry, has been decorated with a military cross by President Poincare for capturing 100 Germans, including two officers, aided only by a single companion. The curt reference to Corporal Gouteaubier's exploit in army fields reads:

"For bravery and contempt of danger which struck terror into the trenches and shelter of the enemy. With a single comrade he has made 100 prisoners, including two officers, whom he took to the rear and then returned to his post."

When Corporal Gouteaubier was paraded before President Poincare on the recent visit of the latter to the Somme front, he told the story of his feat at the request of President Poincare.

It was on July 26 before Hen Wood. The French troops had just dashed forward at the German positions. The first wave had swept over the enemy's trenches and the second had followed to complete the operation. However, from a hollow toward the right, a well sustained fusillade was being poured on the flank of the attackers.

Gouteaubier, who was at the right wing of the second wave, called out to one man, "Guliot, come with me. The two men approached the spot whence the firing came. They climbed from tree to tree until they were close to the shelter where a German company was holding out. Guliot threw bombs as fast as he could into their midst and the fire ceased. "Surrender!" shouted the corporal in a stentorian voice from behind a tree.

In response to his demand, 100 Germans emerged from the shelter with uplifted hands, led by two officers. "Pass along this way," shouted Gouteaubier from his hiding place. "Go out of the wood at once and march to the rear." Two minutes later the 100 Germans, shepherded by the corporal and Guliot, arrived at the French lines.

The prisoners admitted that some of their comrades remained in the shelter. "Come on, Guliot, let us go and fetch them," said Gouteaubier. The two men started back, but Guliot fell with a bullet in his breast and the corporal had to abandon his enterprise.
