Cuban Surgeon General Bridegroom in Greenwich Marriage.

GREENWICH, Conn., Sept. 27.—Dr. Victor Lopez, surgeon general of Havana, Cuba, thirty-eight and Mrs. Josefine Finlay of Porto Rico, thirty-six, were married by Justice of the Peace Rungee here today. Attorney Louis W. Osterwels of No. 209 Fifth avenue, who motored here with the couple from New York, and Albert Hughes, a managing clerk in Justice Rungee's office, witnessed the ceremony.

The couple will sail for Cuba tomorrow morning. Mrs. Finlay and her first husband were divorced. She owns extensive sugar plantations in Cuba and is reputed to be a millionaire. Dr. Lopez also is wealthy.

BROOKLYN IS STILL ONE AHEAD OF PHILLY

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The race for the National League pennant was virtually unchanged save that Boston won two games from Pittsburgh while the Robins and Phillies were each winning their one scheduled contest. Brooklyn remains a game ahead of Philadelphia and is now three and one-half games ahead of Boston. The standings of the three leaders last night follows.

COPPER ORDER AMOUNTS TO \$125,000,000

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—According to trade reports current in the financial district today, a big foreign order for copper aggregating 200,000 tons, or over 400,000,000 pounds, has been placed by foreign interests, chiefly British and French, with large producers in this country. These include the American Smelting & Re-

fining company, and the United Metals Selling company, which represents Amalgamated-Anaconda interests. The copper is to be delivered in the first six months of 1917. This contract is unprecedented in the history of the copper trade. The total amount involved in this transaction is said to be about \$125,000,000. The price is believed to range between 26 and 27 cents a pound.
