DUST STORM DOES DAMAGE

The worst wind and dust storm of the year visited Pendleton yesterday and did considerable minor damage besides thoroughly aggravating housewives and residents in general.

A good many telephone and light wires were torn down during the day and evening by the wind. The telephone office reported 229 telephones in the city reported out of order by 9 o'clock this morning and a couple of dozen or more houses had reported their lights off.

There was no damage done to the high line of the P. P. & L. Co., but here in the city a number of short circuits resulted from the blowing of limbs of trees against the wires. These short circuits caused the switch to blow out at the plant and the city was without "juice" for short periods while the switches were being repaired.

The air was heavily laden with dust all day and a strong wind blew. The dust crept into every house in town and gave plenty of work for the housewives.

The wind died down during the night and today is clear and bright.

MOKEL-LYTLIE LABEL SUIT IS ON TRIAL

Veterinarian is Charged With Selling Plaintiff of Knowingly Acquiring Diseased Cattle.

PORTLAND, Sept. 27.—The \$50,000 damage suit for alleged libel brought by George R. Mokel against W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, went to trial in Judge McGinn's court yesterday morning.

The charge of libel is based on a letter written by Lytle to O. E. Plummer, secretary of the Portland Union Stock yards, last April when Mokel's name was before the United States senate for confirmation as postmaster at North Portland. The confirmation was never made.

In the letter Lytle told Plummer he knew that Mokel had knowingly sold cattle affected with tuberculosis to buyers throughout the state, and that he was in league with James Dorsey of Illinois, who was then under indictment by a federal grand jury for interstate shipment of diseased cattle.

WORN CHIFFON SLEEVES.

Little dark silk dresses with chiffon or Georgette crepe sleeves, which have been worn so much during the spring and summer, are beginning to look a bit stringy and shabby now, as to the sleeves. Unless one wishes to renew the chiffon, the sleeves may be cut away altogether, the armholes bound with a piping of the silk, and the dress worn over a thin white blouse, which forms a gump. This will not be too warm for the autumn days, and will give the frock a pleasantly changed and freshened look.

Daily Chats With the Housewife

THE NEW WALL PAPERS.
Some of the hitherto popular colors and shades in wall paper patterns do not figure at all in the new fall styles and patterns. Reds and other of the darker shades do not appear in the samples now being shown. Blacks and whites will remain in favor in next season's goods. Certain shades of gray and tan will also be used, but the new styles are leading more toward the lighter tones. The price of raw colors has risen greatly, and many shades are unobtainable.

The absence of these dark-colored papers will result in better lighted rooms. The reds, browns, and other dark papers have the expensive habit of absorbing the light. Statistics show an enormous wastage through misdirection of light and a lack of intelligent diffusion of the illuminant. White cartridge paper reflects 89 per cent of the light, while dark brown reflects but 13 per cent, blue-green but 12 per cent and black five tenths of 1 per cent. With lighter colors on our walls, there will be a vast improvement in our home lighting.

FLOUR. For a loaf cake, add a few nuts and raisins.
For the filling for the layer cake beat well together the white of 1 egg, a pinch of salt, 1 cup of apple sauce, and 1 cup of sugar.

SPICE CAKES.
To 1-2 cup of sugar and 1-2 cup of butter or lard well creamed, add 1 egg, 1-2 cup of molasses, 1-2 cup of milk, 1-2 teaspoon of soda, sifted into 1 1-2 cups of flour, and a pinch of salt. To these add 1-4 teaspoon each of cinnamon and cloves and 1-2 cup of currants. This makes 15 or 18 small cakes.

DATE LOAF.
One cup of sugar, 1 cup of sour milk, 1 piece of butter the size of an egg, 1 teaspoon of soda, 2 1-2 cups of flour, 1 pinch of salt, 1 cup each of dates, raisins and nuts. Bake in a loaf or sheet.
For the frosting, mix together 1 cup of sugar, and 1 cup of chopped nuts; moisten with sour cream.

APPLE CAKE.
Cream 1 cup of sugar and 1 of butter. Add 2-3 cup of apple sauce, 1-2 cup of warm water, 1 teaspoon of soda, a pinch of salt, and 2 1-2 cups of flour.

RELIQS OF THE INCAS 2,000 YEARS OLD ARE TAKEN TO NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Many valuable relics of pre-Inca civilization on the west slope of the Andes, 2,000 years ago, were brought to this city by Professor Marshall Howard Saville, former curator of the department of anthropology of the American Museum of Natural History, who returned from a three months' exploration trip in Ecuador and Colombia.

Professor Saville undertook the journey in the interest of the museum of the American Indian-Heye foundation, which will be in the group of buildings of the Hispanic society of America, now under construction in this city.

Among the specimens are pottery, gold, stone and platinum gathered in northwestern Ecuador. The relics were found chiefly in ruins of dwellings built of wood, with stone foundations.

GERMANS THREATEN TO SUE AMERICANS VIA ALLIED BLOCKADE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Reports that German firms may go to court in Germany with complaints of non-delivery of goods contracted for in America but stopped by the allied blockade drew the suggestion from officials here that such litigation might prove a commercial sword that would cut both ways. Should the German courts confiscate American property because of alleged breach of contracts, it was said, the state department would intervene diplomatically to prevent miscarriage of justice.

PERISHING IS NAMED TO SUCCEED MILLS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Brigadier General Pershing has been made Major General, succeeding the late Albert L. Mills.

EARL OF ESSEX DIES AT ENGLISH HOME

Second Wife Was Adella Grant of New York—Essex Was 58 Years Old.

NEW MARKET, England, Sept. 27.—The Earl of Essex was found dead this morning.

Essex was 58. His second wife was Adella Grant of New York, served in the South African war, and won a colonelship in Her Majesty's Imperial Yeomanry. He owned fifteen thousand acres.
