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LOYD-GEORGE SPEECH BIG AID TO GERMANY

Prominent German Editor Declares Military Situation is Better Today Than Ever.

(CARL ACKERMAN) COLOGNE, Oct. 16.—Earnest Posen, chief editor of the Cologne Gazette, Germany's greatest editor, replied to Lloyd-George's interview saying the allies intended to fight until a "knockout."

"If those fellows make peace only when Germany's knocked out, we'll never make peace. For weeks the allies have conducted a press campaign against peace, especially in Washington and have said repeatedly there would be no peace until they reached the Rhine.

"The statements have strengthened our position enormously. My opinion is that the military situation is better today than a year ago. The allies will never be able to break the west front and the situation on other

FRONTS MAY IMPROVE, I HAVE CONFIDENCE IN HINDENBURG

Asked: "Can Wilson make peace?" he said.

"The war is so enormous, former peace making methods do not apply today. An international congress cannot settle it. Wilson's only plan is to suggest through ambassadors that special envoys meet at Washington I do not believe it would succeed now. The allies want peace on their own terms. Certainly we won't consider that. Some Germans are peace-at-any-priceers, but the German people as a whole want peace only when we can exist as a nation."

Posen considers the following conditions essential for peace:

Germany must follow Bismarck's policy of protecting the western border. Perhaps she may take the French fortress of Belgium and also must have an independent Poland. Germany must develop and protect agricultural resources to avoid being dependent on Argentine and Russia for wheat and cattle. She must consider her international position and have colonies.

GIRL SHOTS FATHER FOR REFUSING TO RETURN TO HIS WIFE; IS ARRESTED

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Miss Fern Roberts sixteen, arrested on a charge of shooting her father, Dr. Grant Roberts, dentist, because he would not return to her mother, said, "I hear he's going to recover. I'm sorry I didn't finish him."

The girl said she urged her father to return to his wife and he replied, "No Fern, I'll never live with her again." The girl fired, crying, "You will, or go to your grave."

NOVEL L. ROBYN DIES BY HIS OWN ACTION

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 17.—Noel L. Robyn, fifty eight, an insurance broker, suicided here by jumping from the eleventh floor of the Title and Insurance Trust building. He has a brother, Alfred G. Robyn, American composer and organist, living in New York. Friends were unable to give a reason for the suicide.
