SOLDIER BONUS BILL TO INCLUDE OFFICERS

Officers will be included as beneficiaries of the soldier and sailor bonus

bill which will be presented to congress shortly. This information was received today by Allan A. Bynon, a member of the judiciary committee of Pendleton Post, American Legion, in letters from Senator McNary, Representative Haxley and Sinnott and from the chairman of the legion's legislative committee.

Word from Washington previously has stated that officers were not to benefit by the bonus act, if passed. This, however, will not be the case, the letters say, and all those who wrote pledged their efforts to obtaining bonus for all men who served. Representative Fordney, of Michigan, chairman of the committee which is handling the bonus matter, is also reported to be in favor of no discrimination against officers.
