for forgery, were the last to leave. They were not implicated in the shooting.

"Don't Shoot Jake"

"Don't shoot Jake, he has treated us white," Lindgren told the prisoners when the deputy was being overcome in the jail. Lindgren, known by his fellow prisoners as "The Swede," played more of a general's part in the jail break and was last in the fight and first to leave.

Owens, Hart and Rathie, the first two men of desperate character, followed him into the main office and began their search of the premises for

weapons and ammunition. The private office of the sheriff, in which are kept numerous firearms confiscated in past arrests, was their goal. They were seeking out the office when the sheriff and Wyrick entered casually. They had been to dinner together at the R. E. Chiuoupek home.

One Did Not Go.

Robert Jeffries, a young man serving a sentence in the county jail for carrying concealed weapons, did not attempt to escape with the other prisoners. He has only a few days more to serve and had been incarcerated only 10 days.

Of the men who escaped, Hart and Owens are considered the most dangerous. Both were in the recent series of holdups which resulted in their

capture, July 13, by Sheriff Taylor and his deputies after a thrilling chase. They were being held in the county jail on charges of highway robbery and were to have their hearing before the September term of the grand jury.

Hart a Bad One.

Hart is said to have a wife and a cabin in the mountains southeast of Pendleton and is known in the Yakima valley country as a bad actor.

Jack Rathie, third man in the shooting affray, was arrested June 3 for larceny in the Max Baer clothing store here. He was being held for the grand jury in default of bail. He is a Russian.

Lewis Anderson and Richard Patterson, who made their escape with the rest, were being held to answer for passing bad checks at Umatilla. They were arrested at The Dalles on May 3 and returned to the jail here. Neither is considered dangerous and they have been treated as trustees during part of their time in the jail.

Albert Lindgren, sixth prisoner to escape, was arrested on April 30 for raising checks.

FIVE MEN WERE STILL AT LARGE

No sign of any of the fugitives had been reported up to 1:45 this afternoon, despite numerous rumors about towns that men had been seen, one had been wounded in the arm near the Ganger ranch and others. Officers directing the chase from the sheriff's office said that no arrests had been reported to them and that the only suspects which have been held were tramps at Riparia, on the Snake river, who, after hasty examination, were set free.

Pistol is Found.

The finding of a pistol cached under a bridge near the Ganger place by members of a searching party was reported officially this afternoon. It is believed this is one of the guns taken by the fleeing men and for which re-ammunition of proper size was in

the stock they obtained. Officers believe that there are big possibilities in the Birch creek region, although the nature of the country there will make catching the men a difficult task.

While a large number of men scour the Birch creek region, an equally formidable lot is working beyond Cayuse. The story told by William Kagan, of having seen the five fugitives on the wagon bridge at Cayuse Sunday, is given considerable credence by officers. They instructed Sheriff Warrick, of La Grande, to take up the chase from Cayuse when he came over on No. 17 today.

Hounds Are Busy.

Hounds from the Walla Walla prison, in charge of Warden Earl Melrose, started this afternoon from Rieth for the Ganger place. Tracks found at Rieth which are alleged to be those of Owen and Hart, and more footprints seen near the Ganger place, furnish a working basis.

Numerous phone calls from the Pilot Rock vicinity told the officers that the Ganger place had been robbed this morning early. This, if true, is considered another hot lead, at headquarters.

PAVING STONE IS MADE FROM ASHES OF REFUSE

BERLIN, July 26.—(A. P.)—Out of the ashes left in Berlin's incinerators from the city's burnt refuse, a paving stone, is being manufactured which is said to be as hard and serviceable as granite. As Germany no longer can afford to import paving materials, which Sweden used to supply, the discovery of this cheap by-product is greatly welcomed.

POHNSON GETS 30 DAYS

CHICAGO, July 26.—(A. P.)—Jack Johnson is due for a 30 day preliminary stay in jail, it is indicated. Federal Judge Carpenter told those attempting to secure bond for the negro, he would be incapacitated for about 30 days and said he would act then. Other federal judges taking this to mean Carpenter would personally attend the case and refused to intervene.

GLIDERS MAY BE USED FOR QUICK NAVIGATION

BUENOS AIRES, July 26.—(A. P.)—The use of gliders for transporting passengers and mail on some of the

swift and shallow rivers of Argentina may result from a trial undertaken on the authority of the Minister of Public Works. On the trial trip just made on the Bermejo River it was shown that
