IDEAS FOR HOUSEWIVES HOME DEMONSTRATION

It has been proven that a great saving of gas results from the properly shaped pan or kettle. A utensil with a broad bottom will heat more quickly and waste less gas than one whose sides flare. Covers to pans also conserve heat. The actual fuel cost for heating kettles of different kinds of metal does not differ much under the same conditions.

Gas stoves are usually made with a "simmering burner," which is sufficiently large to keep a kettle at a high temperature, after it has been brought to the boiling point on a large burner.—E. V. D.

HOUSING SHORTAGE IS CRIPPLING SCHOOLS

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—(U. P.)—The housing shortage is seriously crippling the nation's schools. Practically every large city reports record enrollments with inadequate shelter and class facilities, according to a United Press survey. The situation resulted in various makeshifts, no "pass time" systems and hastily erected flimsy structures and portable buildings. Many cities are giving children instruction on the "in-assembly plan" due to a shortage of class space and teachers.

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JUSTICE TAFT TO MAKE ADDRESS AT CONVENTION

CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 9.—(U. P.)—The first speech of William Howard Taft, after his appointment as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, will be delivered here when he presides at the banquet of the American Bar Association on September 2. The invitation to preside and speak had been accepted before his appointment, but there is believed to be no impropriety in the proposed address now that he is the highest judicial officer in the United States. Cincinnati is Taft's former home.

TENNIS CHAMPIONS OF WORLD IN TOURNAMENT

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 8.—(U. P.)—The pick of American, British, Australian and Japanese tennis stars are meeting today in the first rounds of the national tennis championships. One hundred and eight stars are after William Tilden's crown. Tilden, Johnson, Kumagai and Williams, matched in the lower half first round, indicating only one of the "Big Four" gets beyond the fourth round. Contrary to custom, early rounds will be unusually exciting.

POLICEMAN'S COLLEGE IS LATEST IN EAST

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Sept. 9.—(U. P.)—Establishment of a "Policeman's College" in the near future, is seen by Police Commissioner Philo C. Galt, founder of Bridgeport's training school for coppers. The school at present is a round-table discussion of questions which came up during a policeman's ordinary day on his beat. Callahan, a young attorney and ex-service man, explained. The discussion lasts three-quarters of an hour.
