## MANY TIMELY PROBLEMS TO COME BEFORE TOWN AND COUNTRY MEETING

### Annual Convention of American Country Life Association to be Held at New Orleans.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Oct. 31.—(U. P.)—The principal matter before the fourth annual conference of the American Country Life Association, to be held at New Orleans November 10, 11 and 12, is to consider means to abate in some degree the age-old rivalry between country and city dwellers.

There is a wide range of topics to be considered, dealing with the relations of the town or small city to the outlying country. The relationship is four-sided, including trade, social, church and school, all of which are of great importance.

The tentative programme prepared by the secretary, N. T. Frame, of Morgantown, promises to bring out the arguments for and against such questions as these:

Is the present accepted scheme of trade distribution through private dealers in the towns uneconomical? Will it in time be supplanted by co-operative business? Will the farmers co-operative movement eventually eliminate the local dealers?

Do farmers purchase through mail order catalogues instead of through their local dealers?

What responsibility does the retail merchant have as to carrying in stock and using on the country people household conveniences and other things that might help to raise their standards of living? Should he take part in social welfare work whether it gives direct returns in dollars and cents or not?

Can the best adjustment of economic relationship in the community be brought about by farmers and business men belonging to the same country-wide Chamber of Commerce?

What type of programme should the Rotary, Kiwanis or similar clubs adopt concerning country problems?

Is it of greater advantage to the farmers to give first attention to the

### LAST LONDON "HUT" CLOSED.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—(U. P.)—The last of the soldiers' and sailors' huts, the "All Welcome" hut, which will be remembered to thousands of American doughboys who visited London during the war, is closed. It was situated near Victoria Station and had served meals to 2,365,626 service men, and provided beds to the number of 162,569 soldiers and sailors of all nations.
