

**The Sanitary Commission in Florida.**

HEADQUARTERS DISTRICT OF FLORIDA, DEPARTMENT OF THE SOUTH, JACKSONVILLE, Florida, March 3d, 1864.—General Orders No. 19.—I, the Brigadier-General commanding, gratefully recall to the recollection of the troops of this command the debt incurred by them, during the recent movements, to the Sanitary Commission and its agent Mr. A. B. DAY. Much suffering has been alleviated, and many inconveniences removed by the energy and promptness with which the supplies of the Commission have been placed at the control of our medical officers, and for those who have been so benefitted officers and men, the Brigadier-General offers his own and their most sincere thanks.

In addition to the order of Gen. Seymour, which we publish above, acknowledging the prompt and invaluable services and supplies afforded after the battle of Olustee by the Sanitary Commission and its Agent, A. B. Day, similar testimony is borne by Dr. Adolf Major, Medical Director, District of Florida. Dr. Major says that on the arrival of the wounded at Jacksonville he was entirely destitute of supplies, and could obtain them only from the Commission. Dr. Wm. A. Smith, Surgeon 47th N. Y. Vols., in charge of Post Hospital at Jacksonville, states in more detail that after the battle of Olustee he was telegraphed by Dr. Major for supplies to go forward to Sanderson; that there were none at Jacksonville except those of the Commission and that Mr. Day immediately furnished all articles required. He adds that within twenty-four hours after, over seven hundred sick and wounded came in from the front, and that the stores of the Commission again yielded whatever was needed for their comfort and medical attendance. We note this instance as one of many in which great suffering has been prevented by the forethought and charity of the Sanitary Commission. Perhaps it does not often happen as in this case, that all the supplies for the wounded in an important battle have to be drawn from the Commission, and that its services elicit acknowledgements so emphatic as these.

PRESIDENT LINCOLN, at the late Sanitary fair held in Washington used the following language in speaking of the soldiers and those who seem to be most interested in his welfare:

This war falls heavily upon all classes of the people, but the most so upon the soldiers. All that a man hath will he give for his life, and though all have contributed for their substance, yet the soldier perils and often yields up his life for his country's cause."

In this extraordinary war extraordinary developments have manifested themselves, such as have not been seen in former wars, and among the manifestations nothing has been more remarkable than these fairs for the relief of suffering soldiers and their families. And the chief agents in these fairs are the women of America. (Cheers.) I am not accustomed to the use of language of eulogy; I have never studied the art of paying compliments to women, but I must say, that if all that has been said by orators or poets since the creation of the world in praise of women were applied to the women of America, it would not do them justice for their conduct during this war. I will close by saying God bless the women of America! (Great applause.)

THE rebel General Forrest, with 2000 men, attacked Union City, Tenn., on the 24th ult., and captured the small force of Union troops, garrisoning the town. This force consisted of 400 of the 7th Tennessee Cavalry, and they made a vigorous defense, repulsing their assailants three times before they surrendered to superior numbers. The enemy destroyed the defences, and hurried southward with their prisoners.
