Mining Laws of the Third District. At a meeting of the miners of Moore's Creek, held at the month of Bear Run, Nov. 3d, 1862.

Art. 1. This shall be known as District No. 3, Moore's Creek, and shall extend eight miles up Moore's Creek from the warm springs, and shall embrace all the gulches and ravines within the above limits emptying into said creek.

Art. 2. All American citizens may locate and hold claims in this District.

Art. 3. Each mining claim shall consist of two hundred feet, running up and down the gulch or stream upon which it may be located, and extending from bluff to bluff.

Art. 4. No claim shall be considered forfeited from the 1st day of December to the first day of June.

Art. 5. All claims shall be worked at least one day in seven after the expiration of said dates. Otherwise they will be considered forfeited.

Art. 6. Every person shall have the privilege of a drain race through any claim or claims.

Art. 7. Every person shall have the privilege of the necessary amount of water on the creek or any of its tributaries within this district to work their claims, and no more.

Art. 8. One hundred feet front, and running back in a straight line to the summit of the hill, shall constitute a hill claim.

Art. 9. Any citizen may hold one acre claim, one gulch, one hill and one bar claim, by location.

Art. 10. When two or more claims join together, and are worked by companies, they may work any portion of said claims they may deem proper, and not forfeit the rest.

Art. 11. All claims shall be distinctly marked, by notice at each end of the claim, and the name of each claimant shall appear on the notice, and no more ground shall be deemed claimed than is included in the notices.

Mining Laws of the Third District. At a meeting of the miners of Moore's Creek, held at the month of Bear Run, Nov. 3d, 1862.

Art. 12. Any person disabled by sickness shall not forfeit his claim.

Art. 13. All claims shall be distinctly marked, by notice at each end of the claim, and the name of each claimant shall appear on the notice, and no more ground shall be deemed claimed than is included in the notices.

Art. 14. Any person who shall wantonly remove or destroy, or in any way deface, the laws of this district, or any notice on mining claims, shall be fined in any sum that the miners' court of inquiry may direct, and may be expelled from the district.

Art. 15. No person who may hold a mining claim shall forfeit the same by reason of being compelled to leave the district for provisions or supplies for himself or company, provided he does not absent himself for a period longer than sixty days.

Art. 16. There shall be a Recorder for this mining district chosen, who shall be paid two dollars for recording each claim.

Art. 17. Every person holding a mining claim shall have it recorded within ten days from the date of his notice.

Art. 18. Every person holding claims in this district shall appear by name on the records.

Art. 19. Any person holding a claim shall have it represented according to law.

Art. 20. No transfer or sale of any claim shall be valid unless it appear on the records, and the Recorder shall be paid two dollars for each transfer.

Art. 21. All miners' meetings shall be called by the Recorder, at the request of one half or more of the miners.

Art. 22. When disputes shall arise between two or more parties in this district, it shall be lawful for either party to notify all parties interested that, on a certain day and hour, not less than two days nor more than five days from the service of said notice, the matter in dispute will be heard.
