

STAGING.—Staging will be a lively business up this way next summer. In addition to Cornish & Francis' line that is now making daily trips between this place and Placerville, and who intend to continue through winter, we hear that Greathouse & Co. intend to run four stages each way between the two points in the Spring, two for passengers and two for freight and baggage. Thomas & Co. will put on a line from Walla Walla, and we see it stated in the Dalles papers that arrangements are already in progress for stocking the road from that place. Unatilla, with the trade she already has, will hardly be inclined to be outdone and we may reasonably look for a line from that direction. Patterson & Co. will be very apt to stock the road to Salt Lake, and it is pretty well understood that Ben Holiday is negotiating with the authorities at Washington for the carrying of the Salt Lake and Walla Walla mail, in which case, of course, he will have on a line clear through, touching at all the places of importance on the route, including this Basin. The California Stage Company will be stupidly blind if they don't secure the route from Red Bluff via Pit River, Goose Lake and Malheur, and in order to do so they will be obliged to start in next summer. So that when they all get fairly to work there will not be fewer than ten distinct and separate stage lines running in and out of this place, one half of which will be daily. The Salt Lake lines will connect somewhere on the way with stages from Beaver Head as well as those from Washoe and Humboldt; and Lewiston and Warren's Digging will have to be joined to Boise by a connection with the Walla Walla line at some point on the road, or else a road must be built down this north side of Snake on which another stage will run.

Sun says: I was told the other day an anecdote of the Queen, which illustrates her good sense and real desire to promote the welfare of her subjects. She had agreed to have her photograph for the gratification of such of her subjects as might desire to possess the counterfeit presentment of their ruler. She presented herself in a black silk, without a particle of ornament. The photographer ventured to suggest that she should send for some jewelry. "No," said the Queen, "this photograph is to go among my people, and I wish to do all I can to discourage extravagance." It is such little anecdotes as these that have secured the Queen a high place in the regard of the people. I have everywhere heard her spoken of with affectionate respect.

TWO HORSE-THIEVES SHOT!—On the 20th of Oct. two men came to the house of Mr. J. S. Henderson, on Duona Vista bar, and seeing that he had a very fine span of horses, asked him what he would take for them. He answered that he was a stranger here, and that his family being in delicate health and without wood or other conveniences for winter, would oblige him to keep them until he could prepare for cold weather. The parties went away, and that night the horses were stolen, together with another animal belonging to J. Gregory. Mr. Henderson started immediately in quest of the horses and thieves, traveling day and night in the direction of Lewiston, being joined on the way by Peter Williams, Dan Taylor and B. F. Farrish, all of whom had lost stock, and at Camas Prairie they overtook two men encamped, one of whom seemed to recognize Mr. Henderson and drew up a yager and snapped it at him. Mr. H. immediately fired at his assailant with a shot-gun, bringing him to the ground. The remaining thief—for such they proved to be—then fired a revolver, but without effect. Henderson drew his revolver and fired, killing the man instantly. The pursuing party then approached the camp and found that the man wounded with the shot-gun was still alive and able to talk. He gave his name as Harry Welch, but the other man's name he did not give. He also told them where they would find Mr. Henderson's finest animal, which was a mare worth \$500, which he said had given out and they had shot her; the other they had with them. Mr. Gregory's horse they did not find. There were five saddles in camp and two black horses and one bay, which are supposed to have been stolen, but no owners had claimed them up to the time our informant left. They left the wounded man in charge of some Frenchmen who lived about four miles from the scene of the tragedy, and returned. At the place designated they found the animal that had been left, but she was not able to travel, having been shot in the hip. Mr. H. got home on Thursday night last.

The above statement does not include fines collected, as no receipt for fines has been filed in my office since the organization of the county; there has been money paid into the Treasurer, but the persons paying have not filed their receipts in my office; if they had filed their receipts the statement would have been more favorable to the county. The only revenue that can be relied upon from Jan. 1st to May 1st 1864, will be the amount received from licenses, and I think it licenses are collected promptly the county will be very little if any, in debt on the 1st day of May, 1864.
