To all Whom it may Concern. KEEPERS OF SALOONS, BOWLING ALLEYS, Billiard Tables, and all persons selling Spiritual Liquors, in less quantities than one quart are hereby informed that the law requires them to take out a license. The proper way to procure a License is to pay the County Treasurer the amount required by law, to take a receipt from him, which receipt should be taken to the County Auditor, and by him filed, and the County Auditor then issues the License. A number of persons have obtained receipts from the Treasurer and have not filed them with the Auditor, and obtained their License. The County Auditor is required by law to open books, and keep an account with the officers of the County, receiving and paying out money, and every man will see the necessity of filing their receipts with the Auditor, that he may charge the Treasurer with the amount. This information is given to save the persons who are interested in the License question. A word to the wise is sufficient.
