

Correspondence from the Capital.

Lewiston, I. T., January 18, 1864. Ed. Boise News. The rise and fall of Lewiston is known to most of your readers. Unless some new "Florence" should be revealed in this upper country, Lewiston will remain in statu quo for a long time.

The Holidays, just past, have brought out the generous feelings of the citizens, and I believe the strangers stopping here—members of the legislature, especially—will join me in testifying to the hospitality and social qualities of the good people of Lewiston.

THE LEGISLATURE. The work of this body is progressing as fast as could be expected. Members are very industrious—determined to frame as good a code of laws as time and opportunity will permit.

Exports.—The ship Lizzie Moses, from San Francisco for New York, has a cargo estimated at \$250,000, among which are 423 bales of wool, 340 casks of oil, 44,400 hides, 1,800 sacks of mustard seed, 7,000 sacks of copper ore, 95 packages of wine, 46 bales rags, 20 cases of rosin, 110 bales skins, etc.

THE KING of the Sandwich Islands, Alex. Liholiho Kamehameha IV. died on Monday, November 30, 1863, after a comparatively short illness. His Majesty was 29 years of age and had reigned nine years.

In the year 1863 the P. M. S. S. Co.'s steamers carried from San Francisco in treasure the sum of \$1,569,783.67, of which \$31,000,000 went to England and \$10,500,000 to New York. This shipment to England was to avoid war risks.
