San Francisco Correspondence. San Francisco, April 4th, 1864.

ED. BOISE NEWS—SIR: A friend of mine has placed in my hands a slip cut, as I am informed from your paper. It is headed "A NUT FOR CAPT. LEES TO CRACK," and recites some falsehoods concerning me, uttered by Page, and goes on to ask, "is this the Capt. Lees whose praise has been sounded, &c.?" and closes with two lines of poetry. If this article was published in your paper, I complain of great injustice having been done to me thereby. I arrested these men, and Page could have told you why he had to be called to three times, with his own gun presented in my hands against his person, before he gave up his arms and surrendered as a prisoner. Page and his companions were kept in a private room by means of irons and superior force for three days to prevent their discharge upon Habeas Corpus under the constitution and laws of the State of California. After Mr. Beachy arrived with papers which were thought to be sufficient for the extradition of the prisoners, the Police Judge deemed it to be improper to deny them the privilege of Habeas Corpus, or to keep them in secret confinement, and they were accordingly replaced in the City Prison; three days afterwards a writ of Habeas Corpus was served in their behalf. There was no corrupt proposition entertained by me, conditioned for their discharge, although the prisoners were willing and anxious to offer better terms than those mentioned by Page. I will not here go into a rehearsal of my efforts day and night for three weeks to effect the detention of these men, which efforts were successful; but I have laid the whole matter before the Police Commissioners, and I inclose you a copy of their judgment. And now I beg leave to ask you, if, after all my efforts in this case having succeeded, and the murderers not having been corruptly discharged, but sent back and executed, is it a just reward that I should be accused—a thousand miles away from home, and witnesses, by which I could disprove it, of a corrupt proposition which I never entertained, and that the same should be published by all the papers on the Pacific coast, in some cases seasoned with editorial comments, as though the object sought was, not so much to punish the murderers, as to break down the character of the man to whose efforts the public are mainly indebted for their arrest? It ought not to be necessary to remind you that this Page in the same confession makes himself accessory to the murder, and that the statements of such an one should not be received as truth against the officer who sends him to justice, and whose acts are a complete refutation of his falsehoods. I may further state that I have a letter from Renton in which he speaks of Page's remarks about me, and denounces them as untrue. I will not further trespass on your space, but I ask that as a matter of justice you will give this letter and the inclosed Order No. 50, the same publicity you gave to the Nut for Capt. Lees to Crack. I am, sir, your most obedient servant, ISAAC W. LEES, Captain of Police.

ORDER NO. 50, City and County of San Francisco, March 28, 1864.

Whereas—In the published evidence of Wm. Page on the trial of the murderers, certain statements appear derogatory to the character of I. W. Lees, Captain of Police, and accusing the said Lees of certain corrupt propositions to aid in the escape of said murderers—if he, the said Lees, were allowed to have all the money except \$1000—and these statements having been brought to the notice of the undersigned Police Commissioners of the County and City of San Francisco,—

We, the said Commissioners have investigated the charges contained in these statements—have heard the evidence of R. H. Lloyd, Attorney for Hill Beachy—Alexander Campbell, Counsel for the prisoners—D. W. Cheeseman, U. S. Assistant Treasurer—and of several other witnesses, and have come to the conclusion, that the charges contained in said statements are wholly untrue, and that in his efforts to capture and deliver the said prisoners to the authorities of Idaho Territory, the said Lees acted as an efficient and faithful officer.

San Francisco, March 31st, 1864. P. W. SHEPHEARD, Police Judge, and Chairman Board Commissioners.

The Indians in the vicinity of the John Day Mines, continue their depredations upon the whites. A party of six men, who left Canyon City a few weeks ago in pursuit of outlaw Indians are supposed to have been overpowered and murdered, at the time which they had intended to be absent, had long passed at last advices. The horses belonging to a detachment of the Oregon Cavalry sent to that country several weeks ago, were driven off by the Indians, and the soldiers left on foot.—W. W. Statesman, 16th.
