THE WOOD RIVER EXCITEMENT.

A party of some seventy men left here about three weeks ago on a prospecting excitement, with such mysterious and undefined purposes, that we have been thus far unable to ascertain their destination.

The party proceeded to within a short distance of Big Camas Prairie, and finding that they were too early to get across the mountains, a portion of the company concluded to return.

The party then scattered, some returning, and some going on with the hope of getting through. The new diggings are supposed to be in a basin near the head of Wood and Salmon rivers.

DITCHMEN find it a very difficult matter to keep their ditches in repair; as the frost leaves the ground, the water seems to follow it, and in many instances a slide ensues.
