WASHOE—A former Boiseite, now a resident of a Washoe city, thus writes to a friend in this city under date of July 25th. It is a poor business to underrate a neighbor's prosperity, but as the "sage hen" papers never allow a single paragraph damaging to the Northern mines to pass unnoticed, we publish a scrap "for luck" concerning their country which can be set down as a fact:

"The weather is very warm, and every few days a hurricane of sand and dust fills the air, and every house that's not air-tight. Local regulations require a person here to call these hurricanes "Washoe zephyrs," but some few rash men are risking the change of terms and call them hurricanes. You can hardly imagine what a jealous people these Nevadans are of their own Territory, and all that tends to its prosperity. Idaho is a humbug; Montana and all the Northern mines are cheats; and every day "respectable and shrewd gentlemen are returning" and confirm these facts! It is now settled among them that if the riches of all other countries were concentrated in ore, that it would be folly to leave Nevada to go to it. I have seen many bigoted, jealous, and room individuals, but I've never seen a whole Territory of them before. Of course there are many rich men here, but there is, also, a larger proportion of poor men, and actual beggars, than in any community I ever was in. On Saturday two beggars were at the door, and to-day two more applied for alms, and it's been so for weeks past. I'd just as leave take my chances in N. Y. City to avoid beggars, as in Nevada. But it is unusually hard times; thousands of men are thrown out of employment who were in the habit of spending their wages all as fast as they earned it. So we go along."

THE NEW GOVERNOR OF IDAHO.—Hon. Caleb Lyon, of Lyonsdale, N. Y., the newly appointed Governor of Idaho, arrived on the steamer Oregon, and will leave to-morrow for his new home. The Governor is one of the pioneers of this coast, having arrived in California in 1848. He was one of the Secretaries of the California Constitutional Convention, and the seal of that State now attests the originality of his mind, the design being his own. He was appointed by President Polk the first consul to China under the Cushing treaty. He has served in both branches of the New York Legislature, and was elected to Congress from Sillas Waights' old district, by the largest vote ever given a Congressman from there. He assisted Mr. Marsh, our Minister to Turkey, in settling the difficulties between Mr. King, the Missionary, and Greece. His correspondence in the Kotza affair, when he was with Capt. Ingram, is familiar with many of our readers. He was with General Scott in Mexico, with Gen. McDowell at Bull Run, with Kearney during McClellan's Peninsular campaign. He has been through eight battles, is a live Governor, and looks but little older than he did fourteen years ago, when we first knew him knocking about the mountains of California. Being an old miner himself, he can early learn, and we believe will promptly supply, all the wants of the miners among whom he is to govern.—[Oregonian, Aug. 2d.]

THE CORPSE IS DRY.—Joe Baldwin, the jolly ex-Supreme Judge, and author of "Flush Times in Alabama," says that while on a recent visit to Washington, Jim McDougall, Senator from California, and himself went to New York to see the sights of Gotham. After "running together" for awhile, urgent business made the Senator's presence necessary at Washington. When the train arrived at Newark, New Jersey, Mc. got off to "smile," the Judge's strict temperance principles prevented him from leaving his seat. The result was his Senatorial honor got lost. Upon finding how matters stood, Jim rushed furiously to a livery stable, and wanted a fast team to go to Elizabethtown to overtake the cars for Philadelphia. Every carriage was out! The Senator was willing to take anything that run on wheels. A hearse was hitched up, Jim stretched himself inside for a nap, the drivers got on the seat, and off went the team at a rapid pace. After six miles had been gotten over, the drivers stopped at a wayside inn to take a drink. The halt awoke the Senator, who eagerly inquired if they had reached the cars. "No," was the reply, "we are going to take a drink." "The devil you are," said Jim, rousing himself up, "well, I guess I'll (bic) take a drink, (hic) too. The corpse is dry."—[Mountain (Cal.) We learn from Lewiston that the Democrats of Nez Perce, Shoshone and Idaho counties do not recognize the late Convention held in Boise county as a fair expression of the Democracy of the Territory. These counties were not represented in the Convention, and by a misunderstanding with the Boiseites, called a convention to meet in Nez Perce county about the time the convention met in Boise. When they heard of the Boise convention (only three days before its meeting) they withdrew the call for their own meeting and now propose to hold a convention in which all the counties of the Territory will be represented. Mr. Hill Beachy who was nominated for Treasurer, declines the nomination.—[W. W. Statesman.]

YESTERDAY afternoon, at Jas. Hendershot's in the Grand Ronde valley, an altercation arose about a horse race, between a man named Smith and a man named Jake Walters in which several shots were fired, resulting in the wounding of Walters, one ball passing through the fleshy part of the abdomen, and one ball striking the breast and coming out about seven inches from where it entered. The wounds were dressed by Dr. E. A. Stockton of La Grande and are not considered dangerous.—[La Grande Cor. Oregonian, 25th July.]
