EASTERN DATES TO THE 8TH.
 Chicago, Aug. 6.—The following are the main points of a letter referred to in a telegram to-day, furnished for publication in a letter dated City Point, Aug. 2d, which says: Before this reaches you, about one-third of this army will be en route for Harper's Ferry to oppose the rebel invading force. The remainder will remain in front of Petersburg and this point.
 At an interview between Lincoln and Grant the latter obtained reliable information that from one-third to one-half of the rebel army are on the Potomac or marching in that direction, and the balance are holding the intrenchments at Petersburg and Richmond. Grant is still confident.
 An officer from the front who arrived in this city to-day confirms the statements contained in this letter. He says that the forces sent from the army of the Potomac consists of the 2d corps and divisions, numbering in all about 30,000.
 Washington, Aug. 6.—The National Intelligencer, in an extended criticism, pronounces Grant's campaign thus far, as the most unsuccessful of any undertaken.
 Grant has taken effectual measures to drive the rebels from Cumberland valley.
 New York, Aug. 7.—The Herald's special reports that the rebels exploded a mine under our works on Friday. No particulars known, except that little damage was done.
 It is generally believed that Sheridan has been assigned to duty on the upper Potomac.

The Petersburg papers say the rebels brought into action only two brigades in repulsing our troops before Petersburg. One brigade repulsed us with a charge that drove our men, who could not get away from the breastworks and made prisoners of all who were left behind.
 Washington, Aug. 6.—Dispatches from Admiral Farragut, dated the 25th, say: We are now ready for an attack on Mobile. I am waiting for the land forces to get into position. They will be ready about the 29th or 30th.
 Information has been received that the Union officers placed under fire at Charleston have been exchanged.
 Refugees from Fredericksburg report that the town was not permanently held by either side, but both Federal and rebel scouts make their appearance occasionally. Recently a rebel conscripting force appeared at Fredericksburg and impressed all that were capable of bearing arms. There is a small detachment still in the woods looking for those who escaped.

New York, Aug. 8.—The 18th corps' correspondent says: The mine sprung by the rebels surprised no one. Our forces were aware of their intention. It occurred on the afternoon of the 4th and was immediately succeeded by a rapid and successive volleys of musketry. The smoke and explosion had scarcely cleared away, when our men answered the rebel fire, drowning the rebel yell with wild cheers in derision of their failure of the midnight operations. The enemy probably intended to have blown us up as we ran out towards their line and charged through it, but the explosion took place five rods in advance of the head of the gap. Not a particle of the debris was thrown into any portion of our lines, and our sharpshooters did not even think it necessary to answer it. The explosion could bear no comparison to the magnitude of the Burnside mine.
 Immediately perceiving the failure, they were satisfied in raising from behind their works and pouring upon our men a terrific fire of musketry. This developed new batteries and they fired with far more accuracy than hitherto, but it caused only a trifling loss, hardly more than would have been sustained ordinarily in picket firing. The enemy must have suffered more, as they exposed themselves by firing fast volleys and were in full range of our batteries which was greatly superior in numbers to theirs.

New York, Aug. 8.—The Tribune's special dispatch says: Gen. Ames was dangerously wounded in the charge made by the rebels after exploding their mine.
 The Herald's City Point dispatch of the 8th says: Gen. Grant and a portion of his staff left for Washington the day previous.
 The Herald's correspondent at the department of the Susquehanna says: High authorities acquainted with the general situation of this vicinity believe a heavy engagement will come off at or near Sharpsburg, or Boonsborough, on the old Antietam battle ground, at Gettysburg, perhaps further up. Our movements and that of the enemy's indicate such a result. It is supposed that Longstreet commands the rebels.
 It is difficult to ascertain where the rebels are posted, but the impression among military men here that a collision will take place near Middletown, 13 miles from Frederick.
 Gen. Hunter has been superseded by Sheridan.

Baltimore, Aug. 7.—It is reported here that a force of rebels were crossing the Potomac yesterday beyond Hancock and were going in the direction of Wheeling.
 The same authority says that Early has been or is being reinforced by Longstreet's corps, and that Wheeling is the point to be aimed at. We do not consider the report reliable.

Washington, Aug. 7.—Charleston papers of the 3d contain Atlanta dates to the 1st, which say that the city had been shelled half an hour. Last night the enemy began moving on our left. The Macon and Atlanta railroad trains have been running regularly.
 New York, Aug. 6.—The Herald's Nashville dispatch of the 5th, says that the missing of McCook's expedition exceed 800.
 San Francisco, Aug. 8.—The steamer Golden City arrived from Panama this morning. Hon. John Conness is among the passengers.
 Gold closed in New York on the 8th at 262. Sterling 18 1-2, gold prices, Legal Tenders 39 to 39 1-2.
