MIXING MATTERS.—Under the above head "Observer," a correspondent of the Statesman, writing from Ruby City under date of October 13th, makes an unwarrantable attack upon parties seeking to develop the rich ledges of Owyhee by calling to them the attention of capitalists. The immediate cause of Observer's remarks seems to have been the recent visit of Gen. McCarver and Mr. Strobridge to that region, and the fact that they procured powers of attorney to sell in San Francisco, New York and other markets, a large number of feet in some of the best ledges in Owyhee county. If the parties who, for want of means, are unable to develop their ledges and are unwilling to sell to those who have the means, it will certainly not be an injury to the country, but on the contrary, must result in great good, not only to those who have sold a portion of their latent wealth in order to develop and bring to the surface the remainder, but to those who have not sold as well as to those who are engaged in other pursuits, for whatever tends to set the wheel of progress in motion in a rich but inactive quartz mining country must redound to the general welfare of the people of whatever pursuit. As to the insinuation that these ledges have "never been prospected to the amount of half a dozen days work," it is entirely groundless, as evidences in possession of these gentlemen abundantly prove. We have been shown a list of all the feet procured by Messrs. McCarver and Strobridge in Owyhee county, to which is attached a certificate of Hon. Gilmore Hays, County Auditor and Recorder, under the seal of his office, that they have each and every one been properly recorded and the necessary amount of work done on each to constitute them the property of the parties making the transfers and the powers of attorney. These comments and statements of facts we make as we believe in justice to the parties who have confidence in the richness of the mines, and are spending time and means in order to develop them, and who have been unjustly assailed for doing what the writer of the accusation had not the enterprise or means to undertake.

HOLBROOK'S MAJORITY OVER JUDGE PARKS.—The Union candidate for Congress—is, in this county, 694. In Idaho county, according to partial returns, is 57. Owyhee county gave Parks two majority, and Alturas 19. Nez Perce gave for Parks by a small majority—which the Age of the 15th does not give in figures; assuming it to be 20, as we have heard it stated, and as far as heard from—including the above named counties—Holbrook's majority is 712, with Shoshone and Owyhee to bear from, as well as one or two precincts in Idaho.

ELECTION MATTERS.

Editor News.—In as much as there is an under-current of insinuations in relation to the manner in which the election of 1863 was conducted on the part of the officers of said election, casting reflections upon that body which are unjust and without any foundation whatever; and the insinuations coming as they do from members of the Democratic party in private circles, and also heralded from the stump by two of the prominent speakers of the late canvass, (gentlemen, too, above all others, from whom such unkindness was least expected,) and the undersigned having acted as one of said board of judges of said election, at the unanimous request of the Democratic Club which was organized to conduct the canvass of that year for the best interests of the Democratic party; and having on my part yielded to the request of my Democratic friends, I accepted the nomination and went into their service by pledging my honor as a man and as a true and unwavering Democrat, that I would, to the utmost of my ability, and with an unwavering and vigilant eye, watch the proceedings of the election and make a fair and impartial account of the same to them—all of which was faithfully performed on my part, (and I must, in all candor, say the same for all who were concerned with me in the matter,)—for the satisfaction of the curious, an explanation may be necessary to show how the business was transacted. It was commenced by unlocking the ballot-box and spreading it open before the assembled crowd and their attention called to the fact, after which it was again closed and the polls declared open for the reception of votes. Voting then commenced, and from that time until the close of the polls at night, the clerks were almost incessantly writing the names of the electors. After which time we unlocked the box and counted the tickets deposited therein to see how the number of tickets corresponded with the number of names on the poll-list, as directed by law. We then proceeded to open the tickets and lay them in two piles—one Union and one Democratic, and all the scratched tickets were placed in a third place, and the last-named tickets I think amounted to twenty-seven, while the whole number of votes cast was something over twenty-six hundred. We then commenced by counting them in numbers of five—counted first by one of the judges and passed to the inspector and again counted and passed to the other judge, and he again counted and credited to the clerk five Union or five Democratic, as the case might be. They then tallied five cast for all the candidates named. After this process was gone through with we then turned to the scratched tickets and called and tallied them one by one. We then certified and signed the returns, placed the tickets back in the ballot-box where they remained, I suppose, until the late election, where any one might have seen them if they had desired. Now, the main object in publishing this statement on my part, is to place myself aright before the public, and that can be done only by calling on the parties who have from the stump, in the late canvass, charged fraud upon the officers of the election of last Fall, and in this statement I can only say that no one has spoken of the matter publicly, in my hearing, but E. D. Holbrook and Joseph L. Allison; the former made his statement in the Democratic Club, at a special meeting held Thursday evening before the election on Monday; the latter made his statement on Sunday evening before the election on Monday. At which times they spoke as follows, to wit: After having spoken of ballot-box stuffing and fraud generally, each of the parties made use of nearly the same language, to this effect—We hope that this year we will have a different kind of ballot-boxes than the ones we had last year; we don't want those hungry kind of ballot-boxes that have to go to meals three times per day, and leave the presence of the voters. Now, I charge that this language was used at the times and place as aforesaid, and believing as I do, that the aforesaid verbal advertisement of fraud in the election of 1863, does me palpable injustice, and all those who were concerned in the matter as officers of election, and my future course in this, as a personal matter, will be governed by the action of the parties themselves in reply; which reply I respectfully demand.
