THE present condition of the finances of the Centennial may be briefly described as follows:

The State of Pennsylvania has appropriated \$100,000; the city of Philadelphia, \$1,500,000; subscriptions to the stock fund now amount to \$2,100,000. The State appropriation goes, by the terms of the donation, to the erection of Memorial Hall, the exclusive use of which, for the time of the exhibition, is conferred upon the management of the Centennial. Memorial Hall is to be a permanent Art Gallery, three hundred and sixty-five feet in length, two hundred and sixteen in width, and fifty-nine in height, (over the basement of twelve feet,) and crowned in the center by a dome. The materials are granite, glass, and iron. No wood is to be used in the construction.

MR. RICHARD B. IRWIN, the corruption agent of the Pacific Mail Company, stated before the Congressional Ways and Means committee that he had disbursed \$750,000 among members of Congress and the press, as follows:

Charles Abert, \$7,000; O. J. Averill, \$10,000; J. G. Berrett, \$10,000; E. H. Cormack, \$2,000 or \$5,000; A. B. Corwin, \$3,600; L. E. Chittenden, \$5,000; B. H. Cheever, \$5,000; H. G. Fant, \$12,000; John W. Forney, \$25,000; Samuel A. Hatch, about \$20,000; S. R. Ingham, \$10,000; William Moran—don't recollect Alexander W. Randall, \$10,000; John D. Rice, \$25,000; Wm. B. Shaw, \$15,000; Charles H. Sherrill, \$500; J. G. Schumaker, \$300,000; A. H. Whitting, \$100,000. This list included all persons employed by him, and he knew only two others employed—Wm. S. King, whom he paid \$125,000, and R. C. Parsons, who received \$10,000, both by order of Stowell.
