CLASSEN'S QUARTZ MILL.—The large 20-stamp mill formerly known as the Cobden mill, on the Chickahominy ledge, five miles above here on Moore's creek, was some time ago purchased by Mr. J. M. Classen, to be removed and put up at his Pioneer ledge, about two miles from Placerville. The removal is now going on, by the contractor, Mr. Phillips, who has large ox teams engaged for the purpose, and in about a month the whole concern will be placed upon the new location. Mr. Classen is pushing things vigorously at the ledge, to open operations at the earliest possible day. The road is completed from the "Town" above Placerville, to the mill site, and there are in all eighteen men employed at present. As soon as the mill is all brought to the ground, more men, carpenters and others, will be put on to hurry it up. The ledge prospects very richly. Large streaks of sulphuretted ore pervade the great ledge, and these yield heavy per centages of silver and gold. Big products may be expected when the work is fairly at the mill. Mr. Classen is exhibiting tact and a knowledge of quartz mining in his prosecution of the work.

THE WEATHER.—This is a very unusual season in point of weather everywhere, it seems. Here in Idaho City we are having a temperature and visitation which puzzles one to divine whether it is last Winter or next Fall. But then this coolish weather is exactly what the miners want, as it assures them more water and a longer working season. It is pretty rough on the "individual man," however. From the Montana papers we learn that a severe storm of snow and sleet prevailed at Helena and about there on the 17th and 18th of May. The Owyhee papers tell of cold, blistering weather in that region. The Southern Oregon section is suffering for the want of rain; while in other parts too much rain has fallen for the good of the crops, so saying nothing of bodily discomfort therefrom. Eastern exchanges nearly all speak of the unusual weather which prevails there. What's coming, we wonder—Millennium, or the next Winter before its time?

DISTRICT COURT DECISION IN ATTACHMENT CASES.—In the case of Hosmer, Goewey & Co. vs. Lucy, on a motion to dissolve the attachment, on the ground of a defective bond, Hon. J. R. McBride, Chief Justice, recently decided a question quite important to litigants. He held that the undertaking of snow and sleet is usually termed "and be tried and executed by the plaintiff," as well as his sureties; and that an undertaking by sureties alone was insufficient. As the opposite practice has prevailed heretofore, it is important that litigants should take notice of this ruling. In the above case the attachment was dissolved on that ground, among others.

ANOTHER CASE.—Last Saturday we published a notice telling of a pair of spectacles found by Mr. P. B. Smith of this city, which were left at our office for restoration to the owner. That morning, early, the owner called and was rejoiced at recovering his glasses. He had lost them the day of the fire, they were indispensable to him, and he had vainly before tried to get trace of them. A single notice in the paper accomplished for him what he had himself failed in doing. There is a good lesson in this for persons who ought to advertise but do not.

MINERS' BREWERY.—This popular resort is to reopen to-morrow evening, under the proprietorship of Meyerbauer, of the old firm, and Mr. Kild, formerly of the Pacific Brewery, who has purchased the interest of Mr. Fischer. The brewery, bakery and saloon are all included in the new establishment, which is rebuilt upon the site of the old Miners' Brewery, on Main street, above Wall. The proprietors will have a grand opening time.

ARRESTED.—On Tuesday evening officer Gorman arrested a man named Edward Marshall, on Buena Vista Bar, on a charge of stealing two horses from Blaine county, Oregon. Marshall made a desperate resistance with a revolver, but Gorman was too much for him, and soon caused him to surrender. The stolen horses were also taken in charge by Gorman. Marshall has waived an examination, and remains in prison to await trial.

PIPE LOST.—On Buena Vista Bar, on yesterday morning, Mr. Ben. F. Wood lost a meerschaum pipe. It is silver mounted, and has his name engraved on the neck of the stem. ICE.—Dryde McClintock and Sam Stewart don't forget the World office in the way of ice in chunks, albeit it is giving us cold comfort these coolish days. Chasley says he will have hot ice of mornings for his customers if the temperature continues as it has been for the better part of the week.

AN OLD ONE.—We learn that the father of one of our citizens has lately arrived in San Francisco from Ireland, and is 103 years old. But old as he is, he thinks he can beat his son in a foot race, and says he is coming up here to work at mining.

PROPERTY SALE.—The Jenny Lind Theatre was lately purchased by Chas. J. Bernstiel, merchant of this city, from S. G. Rosenbaum, and sold by Mr. Bernstiel in a day or two after to Geo. Libby & Co., who now occupy it.

GOOD CLEAN UP.—A partial clean up of the claim of Col. S. A. Merritt & Co., known generally as the "White Boys' claim," on Bannock bar, just above the city, was made last Wednesday, and the sum in bullion amounted to over \$9,000.

FROM OWYHEE.

The following items are condensed from the Avalanche of last Saturday: A new and very rich discovery has been made in the Flint District. Indians still infest the road from Silver City to Humboldt. Signal fires were seen in China Cañon, beyond Owyhee river, last week. Captain Conrad, formerly of Co. B. 2d Cal. Cavalry, and late Sutler at Camp Lyon, Owyhee, died May 29th, of brain fever. R. H. Brown, Register of the Land Office to be located at Boise City, returned to Silver City, May 30th, from an official visit to San Francisco.

The lower tunnel of the Poorman, 800 feet deep, and the South shaft, 250 feet depth, were brought into connection a few days ago. The Poorman extension in Webfoot gulch is being worked with prospects of good success.

The citizens of Silver City propose to prepare against fires by ditches, reservoirs, hose and pipes, at a total cost of about \$2,500.

The contract for building a Court House and Jail for Owyhee county, on the east side of Jordan creek, on Morning Star street, near Second, has been let to P. A. McMillan. The contract price is \$16,850. The structure is to be 30x40 feet, two stories high, with the Jail dug into the hill, 22x30 feet. The lower floor of the Court House will contain rooms for the County offices—the upper floor to be devoted as Court Room, 30x30 feet, with 11-foot ceiling.

A clean up of the Oro Fino and Morning Star Co., May 26th, gave \$1,704 56 bullion. A ledge of five feet width has been sunk into by a new shaft from the lower level. Ford & Gafford, of the Owyhee G. & S. M. Co., have leased the Lincoln mill, and after making some repairs will commence to run it. The Company's mine is in the Flint District. The Woodstock Company have to shovel through ten feet deep of snow for from two to three hundred yards to open the road to their mine.

The Leviathan ledge, in the Flint District, is yielding rich ruby silver ore. The weather has been blistering and rainy and cool for the week. Maj. Walker is scouting for Indians.

FROM NORTHERN IDAHO.—The Lewiston Journal, of May 25th, reached us Thursday evening. By it we learn that news of the late great fire was received there the evening of the 25th. There is very little local news in the paper. Late advices from Pierce City say McCarty, who was recently shot, is recovering; that half a dozen hydraulics are running; the snow is fast disappearing; one hundred and twenty-five whites and five hundred Chinamen are in the camp; and so far upwards of \$12,000 had been sent by Express from there to Lewiston.

The news from Palouse diggings was fair. Companies at work make from \$6 to \$7 per day to the hand. It is believed that more extensive gold fields will be discovered about that region next summer.

The Journal urges the Lewiston people to take measures to secure the Lemhi trade. It also takes occasion to give a sly, but merited, dig at Judge Kelly in regard to his projected Lemhi term of Court in July. He has been shamefully neglectful of his official duties in Northern Idaho.

Gov. SMITH, of Montana was at St. Louis, May 17th, on his return to that Territory.
