We are permitted to copy from a letter dated at Leesburg, June 16th, the following extracts. The writer is a lawyer, formerly of Idaho City. He says:

"I arrived here last Tuesday; lost three days on the road; had all sorts of weather and experience. The mosquitoes nearly eat us up on Camas prairie; had the breath blown out of us on Lost river; were snowed in on Birch creek, and had to cross the mountain between here and Salmon river in a heavy rain."

"There is still four feet of snow in the mountains, and the high water in the creeks retards mining; still a good deal of work is being done, and some claims are paying. John Clowry has the best thing yet struck in this country, up in Sierra gulch, about ten miles from here. He will make \$50,000 this summer. Some other claims are paying reasonably, but none anything like his. Money is scarce, and will continue to be until the water subsides. I do not think the camp will give the big strikes that Idaho did, but I think there are claims that will pay from \$8 to \$10 to the hand. An immense amount of prospecting is being done, and if there is anything rich within fifty miles all around this, it is likely to be struck this summer. I am going out on a two weeks' expedition with Marion Moore."

FROM MONTANA.—We gather the following items from the Virginia City Post of June 29th: The Territorial Statute books had arrived from the East, and were being distributed agreeably to Gen. Meagher's list.

The destruction of the Snake river bridge causes a serious detention to passengers and mails. The flood which swept it away was the highest known in that country, and overflowed the land about Snake river and Market Lake. A basket ferry rig had been temporarily substituted to cross passengers and mails. The Masons of Virginia City grandly celebrated St. John's Day. A negro named George McMinn, was crushed to death by the caving in of a mining claim near Virginia City.

Grasshoppers have almost entirely destroyed the grain and vegetable crops in Beaver Head, Big Hole and Stinking Water valleys. Gallatin Valley had not suffered much so far.

Wm. Hudson, a driver on the Overland route, was drowned in Snake river while in the act of crossing over in the basket ferry rigged where the bridge was lately swept away. The rope broke while he was in the basket. Surveyor General Sol. Meredith and family had arrived at Helena from the East.

Capt. Spear, an English nobleman, of the 79th Royal Rifles, who was on a pleasure tour of the Plains, was shot dead by a Federal soldier on board a steamer 100 miles below Camp Cook. The soldier was on sentinel duty, and gave no clear excuse for the shooting.

Judge Clarkson was upset in one of Wells, Fargo & Co.'s stages on the way to Virginia City, and sues for \$50,000 damages.

The mercury went up into the nineties in Virginia City during the week ending June 29th.

The steamers Octavia and Guidon arrived at Fort Benton, June 20th, the former in 45 days, the latter in 71 days from St. Louis. The Octavia brought 70 passengers and 174 tons of freight, the Guidon 57 passengers and 225 tons of freight. About twenty other steamers were due within a week.

Gen. Thoroughman's expedition to the Yellowstone, against Indians, left Helena June 22d.

An exchange says that the death of one person in Springfield, Mass., from eating pork, has caused that whole community to abstain from the use of that meat, while if a dozen had died from drinking whisky, not a half dozen of the citizens would abstain from its use.

In the District Court for the Territory of Idaho, Second Judicial District.

To WM. DONELY:

IN THE NAME OF THE PEOPLE

of the United States in the Territory of Idaho: You are hereby notified that there is now on file in the office of the Clerk of the District Court of the 2d Judicial District of said Territory, in Idaho City and county of Boise, the complaint of A. D. Saunders and others, demanding judgment against you for the sum of twelve hundred and twenty-five dollars (amount due for water for mining purposes, sold and delivered), and for costs of suit, and that unless you appear and answer to said complaint within ten days after the service hereof, if served within Boise county, and within twenty days if served out of said county, but within said Judicial District; and within forty days if served out of said District, (exclusive of the day of service), judgment will be taken against you by default for the sum of \$1,225 and costs of suit.

In testimony whereof, I, Wm. B. Smith, Clerk of said District Court, have hereunto set my hand and affixed the seal of said court, at Idaho City this 4th day of July, A. D. 186
