HANDSOMELY DONE.—The proprietors of the Fast Line Freight Vegetable Depot, next door below the Post Office, on Montgomery street, yesterday sent to this office a champagne basket filled with early choice and seasonable vegetables—summer squash, beans, corn, cucumbers, carrots, parsnips, &c., from Boise Valley, and, to "favor the lot," a number of very palatable ripe early apples, from Marysville, California. The Fast Line Freight market is daily replenished with vegetables of all kinds direct from Boise Valley. The market owners run their own six-horse team spring wagons to and from the Valley daily, and carry passengers also. They had the first watermelons of the season, which came on Tuesday evening's wagon. The proprietors have our thanks for their generous offering.

CODY'S EXCHANGE.—On Saturday last, the temporary wooden structure which Mr. Cody erected just after the fire, on his old corner, was very suddenly removed, and as if by magic, almost instantly was Cody found snugly fixed up in the saloon line in the large, cool, commodious basement of his new and perfectly fire-proof brick on the exact site of his former saloon which went in the great conflagration of May 17th. Cody has now the best and most substantial brick walls to his building of any in all Idaho, and, when completed, so will his new structure be one of the handsomest as well as the most durable. It is the most noted business corner in town, and we are glad to see its proprietor prospering, as he deserves.

SCHOOL EXAMINATION.—The examination at the District School on Buena Vista Bar, of which Mr. Hibler is Teacher, will take place to-day, under the superintendence of Mr. Wm. Fagan, Superintendent of Schools for Boise County. We ought to mention, in connection with this, that Mr. Fagan presided at an examination of the Idaho City District School, of which Miss Mary Mower is Teacher, a few days ago, and found the scholars generally proficient in their studies. Premiums for good conduct were awarded to Miss Laura F. Harr and Master John Cecil. Miss Mower's school has an attendance of about forty pupils. She is a very competent preceptor.
