NEW YORK, Sept. 17.—Gen. Schofield has ordered an election for 105 delegates, Oct. 22d, in Virginia.

The National Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows commenced session yesterday. Juarez declined to deliver the remains of Maximilian to the Austrian Admiral. He says he will deliver the body only upon proper official request of Maximilian's relatives.

Gen. Canby has ordered that all who pay taxes and have their names registered are qualified for jury duty in his military district.

Western dispatches report that five stage stations were attacked by Indians in Kansas. A Government train was attacked east of Hays City, and 30 animals captured and two drivers killed. The Indians all along the road threaten destruction to travel; and are burning all the hay and grass on the route.

An Havana dispatch says the merchants of that city having complained that the taxation was too heavy the authorities answered that there were enough bayonets to enforce the collections.

European dispatches report unparalleled mortality in the Turkish army. Out of 23,000 Egyptians who entered the army last year, 17,000 have died.

The Antietam National Cemetery dedication took place to-day. The military and Masonic body escorted the President and party to the cemetery, where an immense crowd had assembled. Gov. Swann, on assuming the chair, tendered a welcome to the President and Governors of other States. The President invoked the Almighty to speedily restore harmony to the country. The Grand Master of the Masons, M. D. Laird, delivered the ceremony at the laying of the corner stone; then followed ex-Gov. Bradford with an oration. After referring to the distinguished persons present he gave a history of the battle of Antietam at great length—referring to circumstances preceding the battle and the public anxiety consequent upon the previous disasters, and how the army was reorganized and won the victory. He concluded by invoking adherence to the Constitution, come peril to it from what source it may, from all State rights or from consolidation in the name of men who made it and by the memory of the men who died for it. He appealed to the people to preserve and protect and defend it. After a few remarks from President Johnson and others, a poem was delivered. The services closed with a benediction, and the Presidential party was escorted to the station.

FROM BOISE CITY.—The Statesman furnishes the following: A man named Forest (not Edwin), charged with passing bogus gold dust, was lately examined before Justice Lindsey, and admitted to bail, in \$1,000, to appear and answer at the next term of court. There are five prisoners in Ada county jail—one for murder, two for assault with deadly weapon, one for highway robbery, and Lidel, the insane man who killed his father near Boise City last winter. Judge Cummins started for Rocky Bar last Monday to hold Court for Alturas, in place of Judge McBride, who has gone to hold court in Lewiston, in Judge Kelly's place.

HANDSOME CONTRIBUTIONS.—The Higgins-Hays election bet, organ grinding, and monkey parade, through Montgomery street, San Francisco, a few days ago, the money received from which was to be given to the Catholic and Protestant Asylums, netted about \$4,000 in coin, besides a wagon load of clothing, groceries, dry goods, &c. The procession which followed the parties was one of the largest ever seen in the city. A brass band preceded the performer. Higgins, having bet on Gorham, played the organ.

OS IR.—One Joseph Samples has been doing rather a heavy wife sampling business in Oregon. He lately married a pretty woman in Jacksonville, who soon discovered that he had a while before married another woman in Marion county, and subsequently another in Scio, Linn county. To escape the penalty of this unlawful sampling, Joseph Samples fled. Joseph! what a name for such a naughty man!

ELECTIONS.—State elections will be held Oct. 8th, in Ohio, Minnesota and Iowa, and on the same day Pennsylvania will elect a Supreme Judge. Oct. 16th, California will elect one Judge of the Supreme Court, a Superintendent of Public Instruction, and County Judges. Massachusetts and Wisconsin hold State elections, Nov. 5th; and Nov. 6th, New York will elect a Secretary of State.

MISTAKEN.—The Oregonian says the President's act, in suspending Gov. Ballard, was "in direct violation of the Tenure of Civil Office law." If its editor will take the trouble to peruse that law he will find that it expressly authorizes the President to make such suspensions.

MONEY MARKET.—The Oregonian of Sept. 21st gives the following from San Francisco, Sept. 20th: The rates of exchange remain at 1 1/4 for coin drafts; 37 per cent. premium on gold for currency drafts; 2 per cent. premium for telegraphic transfers. Gold bars are \$80; silver bars, par @ 1/4 discount. Sterling, 48 1/2.

FOR A DIVISION.—The Lewiston Journal continues to advocate and agitate the division of this Territory, by lopping off what is distinguished as Northern Idaho, and its annexation to Washington Territory. Barkis is willin'.
