## A Crisis.

The situation in the Coeur d'Alenes continues to be of exciting interest. It is the direct outgrowth of the old labor troubles, but is now a question of personal animosity and hardly allied to labor organizations or changeable to them. Martial law routed the criminal element from the Coeur d'Alenes, or nullified its influence. Many of the leaders have gone from the country never more to return. The few that remain have lived to see their influence wane and their power lost. No one conversant with the situation expects an outbreak of organized outlawry in the Coeur d'Alenes. The labor now employed in the mines of that section is not under the leadership of the criminal element that perpetrated the crimes of former years. A few lawless desperados still lurk in the country, having returned to it since martial law has been abrogated, with the hopes of inciting riot and again gaining the ascendancy. Naturally their first attack is upon the representatives of law and order. A study of the situation shows a premeditated plan of discrediting the officers in the community by implicating them in crimes instigated by the outlaws themselves. In the face of the experience of the past it is hardly likely that this will succeed. The strong arm of the government has been withdrawn but public sentiment in the Coeur d'Alenes is with the law and order element and the events of the last few days show that the officers are fearless in the discharge of their duties. It is a crisis for the local authorities with the indications that law and order backed by public sentiment and executed by prompt and vigorous action in the ferreting out and punishment of crime will win out and criminal disorder be driven from the country.

## Note and Comment.

"Martial law is repugnant to our form of government," said Governor Hunt in his proclamation abolishing it, but it appears to have been about the only power to assure peace and safety to the citizens in the Coeur d'Alenes. On Thursday, martial law was abolished in this county. On Saturday night two peace officers were assaulted in the dark at Mullen, and as a result one officer was shot full of holes and one of the attacking party was killed. This was not the result of a personal quarrel, or an individual affair, but the result of the prevailing conditions in the Coeur d'Alenes. The removal of martial law simply emboldened those held in restraint for two years through its influence to remove all other law. It is an object lesson of terrible import.—Coeur d'Alene Press.

Things are becoming normal up in Shoshone county. The murder at Mullen last Saturday night was promptly followed by another at Gem last Tuesday night. Governor Hunt insists that the officers are quite able to maintain order, but he, probably, has not yet taken occasion to inquire why they don't do it. At the rate things are now progressing, we may, with great assurance, look forward to a regular riot and mill blowing up about the first of May. His excellency is quoted as saying that at least 95 per cent of the people of Shoshone county are law-abiding, law-loving and united for peace and good

order. He possibly means by that not to exceed five men out of every hundred is a natural assassin. The state militia should get itself in a state of preparedness for the May walk.—Caldwell Tribune.

The governor found that peace prevailed and that it was, in his opinion, perfectly safe to leave the maintenance of the law in the hands of the local officers. But, as soon as the martial law regime ended, there was a sudden change, and excitement and anxiety have taken the place of the apparently peaceful aspect of affairs witnessed by the governor on the occasion of his visit.

Why is this? It is because there is an element in that section that hates the law and all its agencies. This element chafed under the restraint or martial law and resolved to wreak vengeance on those most prominently identified with its enforcement. So long as martial law continued they feared to raise their hands against their intended victims, but, when the local officers were left alone to protect the community against violence, the midnight assassin stalked forth and precipitated the conditions that are now witnessed.—Boise Statesman.

The work the Lewiston Commercial club is doing is a work of growing importance to the country. The reports of their doings from time to time show only a portion of the scope of their activities. What has been made manifest in the past few days in regard to the visit of the river and harbor committee shows what can be done by active, energetic movement made at the right time. The Commercial club is very much alive and it is to the best interests of Lewiston and vicinity to see that everything possible is done to sustain this activity.

No floods or blizzards or other unprecedented storms have come to mar the hope the Clearwater country has of harvesting the greatest crop ever known in the history of the country. The tonnage of the coming crop will puzzle the transportation companies and fully justify any improvements in the way of new railroad building.

In time of high freight rates remember also the proposition of an open river to the sea. When the crops of the Columbia basin can be floated to tide water there will be millions of dollars added to the pockets of the farmers who produce them.

The Boers seem determined to fight it out if it takes all summer and the stir in England for more financial aid shows that England thinks it may probably take that long.

One good artesian well on the Lewiston side would soon put a quietus on all quibbling over the water question.

The popular cry after May 1st will be "Put me off at Buffalo."
