The thirty two arrests made in Lewiston in the month of May netted the treasury \$92.

Frank Hart of Myrtle is in the city and will leave tomorrow for a visit to the Sound country.

S. W. Cope has purchased an interest in a drug store at Harrison, Idaho, and Mrs. Cope and son will join him there.

Treasurer Kling's May report shows receipts of \$365.84, and warrants redeemed for \$5,785.13, leaving a balance still on hand of \$5,468.38.

John King and wife returned from Portland Sunday. Mrs. King, who has been receiving treatment at the hospital is very much improved in health.

Miss Laura Burns, of Clarkston, returned Monday from Grangeville, where she went to receive the legacy left her by Dell Butterworth. Her interest was \$5,000 in cash and stock in two mines in Buffalo Hump.

The Lewiston Milling Co. has shut down for lack of good milling wheat. Farmers who hold what little is left in the country claim that it is worth fifty cents, which is more than the millers are willing to pay.

By an exchange of corner divisions D. M. Risdon and Mike Ketten have squared up their lots on the hill and have wiped out another section of the Fifth street boundary lines. The only part now remaining is in the Vollmer tract at the head of Fifth street grade.

Del Fountain, the well known horseman is playing lucky at the California races this season. He is reported to have won \$30,000 this season. He won \$5,000 to \$6,000 May 31 on the races won by his horses, Doublet and Snips. Doublet, carrying 117 pounds, won the six furlong handicap, and in the mile and a sixteenth Snips won easily by a dozen lengths.

J. T. Bills, late merchant and postmaster at Melrose, has purchased the J. M. Edwards store and stock at Caldesac and is moving to that place to engage in business. Mr. Bills was in the city this week to make additional purchases to add to his stock. He predicts that Caldesac will be the liveliest trading point on the reservation during the crop season.

Invitations announcing the marriage of Miles S. Johnson were received by Lewiston friends yesterday. Miles S. Johnson and Miss Sarah Grace Swett were married Wednesday June 5th, at St. Andrews Episcopal church, Chariton, Iowa. A reception was given the young couple at the armory at 7 o'clock p. m. They will be at home at Lewiston, Idaho, after June 15.

C. D. Chinn, penitentiary guard, passed through the city yesterday enroute to Boise with prisoners, Gilbert and McGann, recently convicted at the Idaho county term of court. Gilbert is under life sentence for the murder of Joseph Smith and McGann is to serve ten years for the killing of John Morrison. Both are reputed bad men with other crimes to their credit.

## NEWS FROM THE CAPITAL.

State Fair Association Formed—New Extension Granted the Midland—Oil Boom in Southern Idaho.

Boise, May 30.—Some two months ago the case of Roberts vs. Spackman was tried in the district court for Boise county, being decided in favor of the defendant, when appeal was taken to the supreme court. It is an election contest, involving the position of county school superintendent. Miss Spackman ran against Miss Coston, winning by nine votes. At the first action it was stated that she had that majority because it was cast by inmates of the Soldiers' Home, which was granted.

It is an interesting case. The counsel for the plaintiff claims that an inmate of the Soldiers' Home cannot exercise his right to franchise in the precinct of the home unless he had resided in that precinct prior to admission to the institution. They claim that an inmate of that institution, even after having been there ten or more years, may, on the day prior to election, go to the place where he resided before entering the state institution, and there vote, but that he may have no legal residence in the home.

The case was heard on appeal in the supreme court nearly two weeks ago. There has been no decision yet. As it involves the question of legal residence, the decision is looked for by practically every lawyer and old soldier in the state.

There is no longer an institution known as the Intermountain Fair association, it having been made a corporation under the name "The Idaho State Fair Association, limited." It is capitalized at \$30,000. The reason for this was that the lease on the old grounds expires December 1, and it was deemed inexpedient to spend \$5000 to \$6000 in improvements on buildings which could be used only one time. New grounds have been secured and the fair will be held there this year. This adds to the merits of the institution. The four banks of the city have agreed to loan the \$5000 for the purchase of the new grounds, taking fair association bonds for security. It is decided to make the tracks, buildings, etc., the best in the northwest.

The city council, at its meeting Monday evening, granted an extension of eighteen months on the franchise to the Idaho Midland railway allowing the building of a railway over certain streets of the city. The action was taken at the request of Thomas Bates, the promoter and his New York backers. From all information possible to secure at this time it is believed that the road is "a go." Some of the largest capitalists of New York City have interested themselves in the proposition and say that they are prepared to push it to completion. Mr. Bates announces that several of them will be in Boise next week, at which time definite arrangements will be made. Pressure has been brought to bear from Butte, which is having an excellent effect. The people of that city very much desire the railroad to be built, and many of them have been here during the past few months talking in its interest. It is stated by several gentlemen close to the leaders of the enterprise that the road is now certain to be built.

Assistant Pan-American Commissioner Taylor is in the city. He will leave for Buffalo next week. He states that fruit raisers are preparing to forward to Buffalo shipments of their different products as soon as they ripen. It is the intention of the commissioners to have fresh fruit on exhibition all the time after the first product of the season is ready. Such an exhibit, kept in shape, as it will be, is expected to attract a great deal of attention in the east. The one especial thing that has done the most so far, according to the statements of Commissioner Rice, is the timber. Several shipments were made of timber from all sections of the state which has been handsomely prepared and installed in the forestry department. Eastern people, who have hitherto believed Idaho a sagebrush waste, exhibit a great interest and surprise at the showing in this department.

Contracts have been let for hauling large quantities of supplies into the Thunder Mountain section. Col. Dewey, owner of large holdings there, is now in the east purchasing supplies.

The oil boom for Southern Idaho is now well launched, one company owning large holdings having begun placing advertisements. They claim to be certain of striking oil, and it is known they have ample backing to sink several test wells. Their lands are some 18 miles from Nampa, in Owyhee county.

Bert Costello, of Caldesac, was arrested yesterday by Constable Gilman on the charge of carrying concealed weapons. He was tried before Justice McConkey and given \$50 or 30 days. He expects to appeal the case to the district court and pending the hearing will be held on \$100 bond. He is now in jail but will furnish bond today.


