Clarkston schools opened with an attendance of 304. Every room in the new building is full and Prof. C. A. Towne, the principal, expects that additional room will be needed before the term is closed. The school enumeration is about 500.
On Tuesday the land office had up for hearing the protest in the case of W. S. Harris vs. Lee J. Mott. In this case the contestant protests that the timber and stone entry is more valuable as mineral land. The land involved is 160 acres near Hoodoo.

Roby removed from acting as administrator in the estate of Jacob Whittinger alleging mismanagement of the property. Mr. Roby resisted the action by C. L. McDonald, his attorney, and Judge Reese overruled the motion.
School Tax Levy.
The tax levy for independent school district No. 1 has been fixed at 10 mills. The assessment for the year amounts to \$1,086,629.10 and there are 27 widows who are entitled to \$1000 exemption each. The Northern Pacific paid \$514 school taxes this week.

A Late Harvest.
Reservation farmers are looking askance at the skies now-a-days. The threatening weather is not to their liking. There is too much grain still unharvested in the reservation country. B. F. Finnell of Melrose was a visitor in the city this week. He reports that fully half of the flax crop in his neighborhood is either not cut or lies still in the field. The late rains have blocked the harvest. There is a great demand for threshers and the farmers hope for a month yet of good weather before the crops are safe.
The Mascot Mine.
The trouble with the Mascot mining property is in process of adjustment. Capt. E. E. Rogers arrived Sunday from New York and proceeded Monday to Pierce City to inspect the mine. The property is now held under attachment by the creditors, but if from Capt. Rogers' inspection the property is promising enough for development the debts of the company will be assumed by a new management and the attachment dissolved. The management will begin active development of the mine.
Prove up on Townsite.
J. F. Edwards of Culesac was in the city Tuesday perfecting plans for proving up on the Culesac town site. Since the decision from the secretary affirming the decision of the local land office in favor of the citizens of Culesac they have begun to take the necessary steps to have the townsite proved up. A mass meeting was held Monday night and J. F. Edwards was selected to come to Lewiston and take up the work. J. T. Bills who has had some experience in proving up on reservation townsites came to town with Mr. Edwards. The work was taken up Monday with the local land office.
Will Lewiston teachers have to submit to examinations by the state board? is the issue now being contested between the state board and the Lewiston school board. Lewiston is an independent school district created by a special charter which authorizes the local board to examine and license its own teachers. The state board has carried the matter to the Attorney General and has from him an opinion that unless the teachers hold state certificates money from the state will be withheld from the district. The Lewiston board has placed the question in the hands of its attorney and will act on his advice.
Conference Adjourns.
The 28th annual Columbia Conference in session at Walla Walla closed its work Tuesday. Colfax is chosen as the next place of meeting. The Lewiston church received some very substantial aid from the conference where a resolution passed to appropriate \$500 a year for three years to apply on the Lewiston church debt.
Lewiston's minister for next year is to be S. A. Smith who is at present stationed at Davenport, Washington. Rev. Walton Skipworth has been assigned the work at The Dalles. Among other appointments in this district are: Aotuin, J. S. Anderson; Clarkston, W. B. Eakin; Grangeville, O. W. Mintger; Kendrick, F. J. Jones, Moscow C. M. Booth.
