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End Our Yellow Peril

Not since the daily newspaper became a factor in American life—not, indeed, since the press rose into power as an element of civilized affairs—has there been found against any reputable section of it so grave and terrible an indictment as that which came like an echo to the shots the coward Czolgosz fired. Almost before the stricken President was laid upon his bed of pain, the public and its mouthpieces began seeking the causes that impelled the Polish assassin to press the trigger; and the day was not done when editorials were in type attributing the responsibility for the horrid crime to the yellow press. Following the lead of the New York Press and the Sun, newspapers and men high in authority laid the lash upon the New York Journal, arraigned it for its incendiary editorial policy and its inane but inciting cartoons, and demanded the intervention of law and sentiment to preclude any any like future attack upon the dignity and eminence of the national Chief Executive.

As the days pass this cry gains strength, volume and definition; and it is the careful opinion of many that the Federal power must be so exercised as to abolish, in great measure, the license the Journal and its kind have mistaken for liberty. A typical utterance touching the matter is here quoted from the New York Press:

"Yellow Journalism has attained its savage ambition—the assassination of one who, by virtue of his lofty office, represents the very essence of all that Yellow Journalism and Anarchy hate—authority, government and law. At the door of the New York Journal and its kind shall the people of the United States lay the atrocious crime against William McKinley, President of the United States.

The words of the New York Sun are more violent and their application directly personal to W. R. Hearst:

"* * * the infamous handiwork of the editor who proclaims openly that it is his ambition 'to have the Supreme Court of the United States tarred and feathered in the streets of Washington!' Just how long the merchants and the people of New York will tolerate this sort of thing remains to be seen."

Reply to the attacks of its contemporaries is disdained by the Journal, which declares that the present is no time to answer its enemies. It promised to reply to them when the President was out of danger, and ascribed base motives to the editors who sought to make capital out of such a crime. Meanwhile, the sentiment grows fast indeed that it is time the highest office in the nation's gift was freed from the menace of filthy scurrillity and interested malice. Men of all classes are at one in the opinion that we must take one step towards that imperialism which was so awful bogey to certain alleged minds in the last presidential election—and that step shall make it treason to laupoon or ridicule the president.

Several of the foremost editors in the daily newspaper world of New York expressed to an interviewer their personal views of the evil and its remedy; and, though they denied permission to quote them, their utterances are worth hearing, even anonymously. The managing editor of one Brooklyn daily said, in effect:

"Not by the passing of laws

but by fighting the devil with fire—that is the way to check the spread of yellow journalism. If the merchants can be made to see that his advertisement in the yellow newspaper is a proof he bids for the trade of the irresponsible folk who read it—and among those folk are the Czolgosz ilk—perhaps he can be shown how decent people will omit his wares from their purchases."

And that is a way to end the yellows' ways; but a better way must be found, and it seems likely the yellow editors themselves will find and follow it.—Newspaperdom.

The Strenuous Life.

President Roosevelt's life is best given in a brief extract from a speech which he made before the Hamilton club of Chicago, some two years ago.

"I wish to preach," he said at that time, "not the doctrine of ignoble ease, but the doctrine of the strenuous life; the life of toil and effort, of labor and strife, to preach that highest form of success which comes, not to the man who desires mere easy peace, but to the man who does not shirk from hardship or bitter toil, and who, out of these, wins the splendid ultimate triumph."

And the new president has ever been a follower of his own teaching. He has crowded much "strenuousness" into the number of years which he has lived, and is in a position now where he may look forward to the "splendid ultimate triumph."

It is a good doctrine that Mr. Roosevelt has preached. One which every one can take home to himself. It is the doctrine of action. The man who does things has ever been the foremost factor in the world.—Evening Capital News.

In Theodore Roosevelt as president the nation will have for chief executive one of the most masterful personalities that has occupied the White house since the times of Andrew Jackson. Cleveland was self willed and even obstinate but he lacked the art of diplomacy that President Roosevelt possesses. Roosevelt will not only take the initiative but he will by his winning personality carry with him his party and his party's best interests. The president sees quickly with a clear preception and a sound understanding. Public opinion has charged him with being impulsive but public opinion is also willing to bear out the assertion that good judgment and success have uniformly attended his efforts.

The American people have one other crime to deal with besides anarchy, and the foe is of their own household. It is the habit of indiscriminate, violent, reckless personal abuse in political campaigns and for political purposes. It joins hands with anarchy in prompting to murder. It destroys that complete acquiescence of the minority which is indispensable to free government. It works to substitute faction for party, and to create that bitterness against whose destructive influence the great minded father of his country warned the people more than a century ago.—Post intelligencer.

Even the yellow journals and rabid orators recoil at the deed of anarchy but thoughtful people will not forget that they are in a measure responsible for the inception of doctrines tending toward anarchistic ends. Who is it that has been sowing seeds of dissension and strife, who is it that has been arraying class against class and preaching revolution? Let the yellow journals and the rabid orators clear their skirts. The people will not forget.

Every day of sunshine between now and the opening day of the Lewiston fair will add materially to the crowds. The farmer of the upper Clearwater is now in the midst of his harvest and sunshine fills his graneries and his pocket book. He has his eye on the big fair to celebrate his good fortune if propitious weather helps him reap his crops.

Left to the gentle tenor of its way Idaho might soon fall in line with the rest of the nation in the general march of progress and prosperity. The outlook is encouraging. The only threatening doom is that we are drawing near to the time when the reform forces of Idaho will renew their efforts to save the state.

In clearing up Lewiston streets in fair weather the citizens will escape the bad effects of the rainy season. Cleanliness, good streets and good walks will make one of the best advertisements the city can offer to all visitors.

There is a firm conviction in the hearts of the American people that henceforward the anarchists must lead a strenuous life.

Annex the Panhandle.

City editor W. B. Stainton of the Lewiston Tribune is one of those who do not believe the plan to annex the Idaho panhandle to Washington is dead. Here is his summary of the case as stated this week in Seattle:

"As the northern part of our state is settling up and its native resources are being developed, the sentiment of the people appears to become strong in favor of such a change. The interests of northern Idaho are closely allied with those of Washington. Our resources in a general way, are very similar to those of eastern Washington. We have a vast country in which agriculture and mining are the chief industries, and the progress of development in these lines depends almost entirely upon transportation facilities. Communication between the north and south of Idaho is entirely cut off by the mountain ranges. To reach the capital of our state we of the north have to pass through the states of Washington and Oregon. All of our north-west commerce is with Spokane, Seattle and Portland. I believe that within the next few years the sentiment in favor of annexation will become too strong to be longer resisted."

Why should not this question be made an issue in the campaign of 1902? And why should not Spokane take the lead in the agitation which will give to this city, politically as well as commercially, the field for which this is naturally the center? Who will take the first step by calling a meeting to form an annexation society here?—Spokane Chronicle.
