Miss Robbery.

The Silver City Avalanche gives the following story of the robbery:

Sometime yesterday, between Snake river and Caldwell, \$400 worth of ore taken from the property of the Trade Dollar Consolidated Mining company was recovered from a rancher's wagon. At 9:45 this forenoon, John Tonkin was arrested at the United States assay office at Boise, while trying to dispose of \$380 worth of Trade Dollar bullion.

The ore was supposed to have been stolen in July and August last by a married man employed at the Trade Dollar and a single man at the Blaine, both of whom are now in Salt Lake City.

Seven Spokane detectives are here working upon the case. Four of these detectives have been in the various mines of the company, and the other three have been about town. Men thought to be connected with the thefts have been shadowed constantly, with the result that the company has secured two or more arrests, recovered nearly \$1000 worth of ore and bullion, and has the names of several parties who are thought to be directly connected with the nefarious work.

William L. Hagler, who worked at the Black Jack mill in August, was arrested in town this afternoon as a principal in the bullion case.

John Tonkin, who was arrested at Boise, has been working in one of the mine blacksmith shops. He took the bullion to Boise last Tuesday. A detective was on the same stage.
