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Heitfeld and Populism.

When Senator Heitfeld attempted to stampede the populists into the democratic party, he over estimated his own political influence. In the beginning Senator Heitfeld was only the accidental leader of the Idaho populists. His election was not due to the fact that he was a great populist leader but rather that he was the one populist least objectionable to the democratic party. In his political antecedents he was a democrat of the old school and it is doubtful if ever he was thoroughly imbued with the radical doctrines of populism. The very thing that made him acceptable to the democrats then and that strengthens his influence with them now is the thing that has weakened him with the populist leaders who at heart have never been fully reconciled to his sudden rise to power. These leaders will welcome the withdrawal of Heitfeld from their ranks.

As to the future of the populist party Senator Heitfeld's wish was probably father to his thought but is hardly in line with the tendencies of the times. Populism represents the radical element in American politics and under one guise or another it will always be present. In 1896 the radical element gained ascendancy in the democratic party, hence it was very easy to effect the fusion of populists, communists and socialists under the Chicago platform. But under the reaction resulting from two defeats democracy will return to old school doctrines. Populists, socialists and other radical theorists will form another alliance and cut loose from the reorganized democracy. Democracy cured of its radicalism is no haven for the true populist who has the courage of his convictions. The populist will find in the socialist party an alliance more fitted to his theories and a union between these parties would occasion no surprise. The populist party may be greatly weakened by the disruption of the fusion but it will hardly be disbanded.

An Explanation Needed.

Senator Heitfeld embraced among his counts for leaving the Populist party the charge that the Republicans were in favor of Chinese immigration. Why this should become a reason for him to affiliate with the Democracy is not disclosed, particularly as there was no foundation for the Senator's remarkable conclusion. President Roosevelt in his message to Congress strongly advocates the re-enactment of the Chinese exclusion bill, and we believe the erudite Senator from Idaho will recognize the fact that Teddy is just now the leading Republican of the land. Besides, the dispatches tell us that Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, whom the people will always recognize as a leading Republican, is preparing to introduce a bill that will be admittedly stronger than the so called Geary Exclusion Act. Senator Heitfeld therefore owes an explanation to the people of Idaho, for he has abused not only their confidence but intelligence as well. The Republicans enacted the present exclusion law, and they will re-enact another, but it will be stronger. They, like President Roosevelt, are not in favor of any foreign immigration that will have a tendency to degrade the American wage earner

by competition. It is doubtful if the Senator can speak with the same assurance, for he is charged with opposing a bill in Congress that had for its object the exclusion of the illiterate of Europe. Senator Heitfeld is very inconsistent.—Wallace Press.

The Only Safe Anchor.

The Protective Tariff has been the solid foundation upon which the American manufacturers have builded their unequalled prosperity, and it is the only safe anchor for the labor and business of the American people. If the Tariff is excessive beyond the necessities of American labor it may be good policy to reduce it, but it can be safely said that the people of this country are opposed to any reduction that will reduce the wages or the labor of the workmen of the United States. Tinkering with Tariffs unsettles business, causes doubt and hesitation, and the laboring men and their families are the first, last and worst sufferers by the changes made. That fact is again illustrated by the business depression in Germany at the present time—a depression wholly caused by the efforts of the agrarians of that country to prevent the importation of farm products of the United States. It is possible that they will succeed, but it will be well for the statesmen and agrarians of that country, and the people of that country, and the people of all other nations, to remember the prediction of Signor Luzatti, one of the political leaders of Italy, as quoted by the New York "Tribune," that "the adoption of [the proposed new German Tariff] would mean, first reprisals by other nations against German industry; next, ruin to German industries and heavy losses to German agriculture; then, the export of less merchandise and more men, and, finally, the fatal decline of German political influence.—Des Moines "Register."

The resources tributary to Lewiston are truly marvelous. News items of current interest in the last week alone are proof of the assertion. In the Clearwater country the flax crop alone brought the reservation farmers \$400,000 to say nothing whatever of their returns on wheat, barley and sales of live stock. Two wholesale fruit shippers report over 200 carloads of fruit shipped from this section in the past season. In one mining camp alone of the interior the present output is \$80,000 per month. In the great pine belt of the Clearwater one syndicate owns 700,000,000 feet which it expects will take twenty years to market; and up the Snake river sixty miles away a rich coal field sold for \$125,000. Here are resources directly tributary to Lewiston whose development will build a great city.

Pocatello is to have a new post office, and a free delivery system inaugurated in the next sixty days. Lewiston with equal right to the same privileges still suffers the inconveniences of neither. A court of inquiry should be instituted to locate the cause.
