Mayor Skinner received word Monday of the death of his father, Henry Skinner at Brookings, S. D. The deceased was 78 years of age and had been ill for three months. Mayor Skinner went east this fall to visit his father.

Saturday the Vollmer-Clearwater company purchased 10,000 bushels of wheat from A. G. Wisner of Tammany. The price paid was 50 cents per bushel. The wheat is bluestem and will be shipped east for milling purposes.

Orr McMinimy is spending his holiday vacation at home having completed his term of school at the Rimrock school house. After the holidays he will take up a term at the new Lapwai school house which has just been completed.

Contractor Livensparger has the old Hale building ready for removal and will begin at once to move it to the lot north of the city building. When the building is off the ground Mr. Beach will begin the excavation for his new store building.

County Assessor Bashor reported \$13,953.21 collected from December 1st to 20th inclusive and this week turned the amount into the treasury. Treasurer immediately issued a warrant call redeeming about \$8000 of outstanding warrants.

The winter run of Salmon has commenced in the Snake river and Lewiston enthusiasts are out in force. Hooking a salmon is considered the gamiest sport of the season and expert fishermen will pass up all other tournaments for a day on the river with the salmon running.

R. E. McFarland has returned from Rathdrum, Kootenai county, where he was engaged in defending Wilmbusse, charged with the murder of Judge J. C. Brady. The verdict against Wilmbusse was murder in the second degree. This was a very aggravated case and public sentiment was very bitter against the murderer.

Deputy Sheriff Barbour has resigned his position as jailer and office deputy his resignation to take effect Jan. 1, 1902. Mr. Barbour has accepted a position in southeastern Idaho. Sheriff Kroustinger will appoint J. S. Warren of Fletcher to the position. Mr. Warren is now constable of Fletcher precinct.

R. C. Beach has let the contract for a two story brick 51x90 to be erected by Feb. 1st on the lot east of the Odd Fellows building will cost \$7000 and the entire structure has been leased to the Lewiston Trailing Co. Walter H. Seymour, brother of Mrs. Ernest McCullough, arrived here from San Francisco Tuesday to spend the holidays with his mother and sister.

Judge E. C. Steel is in the city enroute to Idaho county where Saturday he will hear the defendants testimony in the damage suit for \$40,000 over the transfer of the Banner mine. The defendants attorneys, Stoll & McDonald of Spokane, are expected in tonight to go on to Grangeville. Judge Steel will hear some matters here in chambers this evening, one being the petition of Mrs. Porter for the continuation of alimony to her minor children. On his return next Monday he will hear the injunction proceedings in the divorce suit.

High Wind.

The wind storm that began early this morning and is still sweeping up from the west [is one of the highest winds recorded here for some years. The signal station record shows that for the five minutes between 4:20 and 4:25 this morning the wind blew with the velocity of 34 miles and the greatest velocity for one minute was 38 miles. Mr. Alps, the observer, thinks that on the hill where the wind had a clear sweep, with less retarding influences it blew from 45 to 50 miles per hour. The station where the observation is taken is somewhat sheltered by the hill and the buildings. Several barns and outbuildings were disturbed by the high wind.
