Being still sore over the defeat of Hunt and loss of its graft on the state printing it is now playing the carping critic act with no other purpose than to stir up strife and fill up space. According to the News the state of Idaho needs a director general and the News man is banking for the job.

Most of the towns and cities of Idaho are beginning to agitate the question of spring elections. Under the general law elections are held early in April. Lewiston under her charter does not hold an election till June, when for the first time the citizens of recent additions to the city will come in for a voice in the city government. Greater Lewiston will then hold its first election and from indications already in the air there will be something doing at the June election.

A radical democratic exchange facetiously refers to the "beneficiaries of the protective tariff" which leads us to inquire who are the beneficiaries of the protective tariff policy of the government. The answer is at first flush the manufacturer, but the laborer, also skilled and unskilled, to whom he has been able to give steady employment at increasing wages, and not only the laborer in the factory but the laborer on the farm and in the mill who has worked to supply the needs of the laborer in the factory. The whole industrial machinery of the nation, wheel within wheel, is hinged on the policy that has made the nation prosperous whenever it is enforced, and has thrown it into idleness and poverty whenever it has been abandoned. The protective tariff policy of the nation has made diversified industry possible, and diversified industry has made the nation prosperous. The antagonist of protection offers the doctrine of free trade, whose patron saint is Grover Cleveland, whose administration epitomized the democratic policy and demonstrated the result in perpetuating hard times. Democracy, present, past and future, seems to have but one idea of statesmanship, and that idea is to make perpetual warfare on the protective tariff system.

This will be another great year for Idaho. Crop conditions are very favorable. Moisture has been abundant for all parts of the state where nature furnishes the moisture and the some source has stored in the mountains an unusually large supply for the use of irrigation. Agriculture and horticulture are well provided for in the coming season and promise abundant crops. Idaho's mines show great development work for the season, not only for those actively producing, but for the development work on new properties. Capital has never been employed with so free a hand in Idaho mining properties as it will be during

the coming summer, and to any one acquainted with the great mineral resources of the state, this means profitable results to the investor and added wealth to the state. Aside from the mining industry, capital will be employed in various other schemes to develop the wealth of the state. In the south along the great valley of the Snake several large irrigation plants will be put in to redeem thousands of acres of the now barren valley of Snake river. In the north plans are on foot for great improvements to develop the lumbering resources of the state, not only in the way of mills, mill sites and dams but for railroads tapping the timber belt to make accessible the great pine timber of the upper Clearwater. The outlook for Idaho was never brighter and homeseekers and investors show evidence of their appreciation of the fact by the way they are acquiring Idaho realty and investing in Idaho enterprises.

Granaries of the Poor.

It was Secretary of War Root that in one of his speeches during the past winter called attention to the fact that in 1901 the separate savings bank accounts in the United States numbered 6,358,727, with an aggregate value of deposits of \$2,507,094,000. The wealth of the richest man beside the aggregate of wealth of the savings bank depositors and wage earners is trifling. On January 1, 1902, the aggregate due depositors in the savings institutions of New York state was \$1,014,300,000; the surplus was \$116,550,000; the number of accounts was 2,010,000 which represents in deposits and surplus a gain of three-fold since January 1, 1880. The savings institution, which is widely and successfully established in New York and in New England, is, outside of Baltimore, scarcely known at the south. For these facts we are indebted to an admirable little pamphlet on "The Saving Institution," originally read before the bankers' convention of 1879 by Henry L. Lamb of Troy, N. Y., and recently reprinted by him with an appendix bringing the subject of his essay down to 1902. This pamphlet is an able discussion of the utility of savings banks, which have been felicitously called the "granaries of the poor."

The savings bank is not organized to make money; it opens its doors to savers; it receives and permanently invests money, while the discount bank opens its doors to borrowers and users of money, for, pay, or, as Mr. Lamb concisely puts it, "the savings bank is a receiving reservoir for a thousand little springs; the discount bank is a distribution reservoir of accumulated capital." If the savings bank is kept to its original idea it will not encroach upon the domain of the bank and the bank will not come in conflict with the savings bank. The savings institution does not hoard money; it invests it through managers who are theoretically intelligent men competent to make safe investments in solid securities. It puts money into circulation and does not withhold it, but adds to the sum of the active capital of the country. The savings banks of New York hold a most one-seventeenth of the bonded debt of the United States; they help through their loans thrifty men to build homes; help to build churches, schools, hospitals and orphan asylums. The savings bank pays the community in which it is placed "because a host of saving depositors is a better class of citizens than an army of tramps."

Eastern capital stands ready to put in a beet sugar factory at Nampa if the people of Nampa will pledge 5000 acres to be kept cultivation for a period of from 3 to 5 years.
