



## COUNCIL SAYS SIX MILLS

Will Issue Bonds to Amount of \$75,000 to Take up Warrants to Complete the Water Plant—\$27,345 Provided by Levy as Determined

The tax levy for the city of Lewiston was fixed by the council at its meeting last night. Six mills is the amount as determined.

The general fund will be given \$13,795; streets, \$7800; library, \$1050; lights \$1575; parks and cemetery, \$2600; sinking fund, \$525—making a total of \$27,345.

It is estimated the water department will yield a surplus of \$10,500, and it will be used for the payment of the first semi-annual interest on the new issue of \$75,000 of bonds which it is proposed to issue to complete the water plant, and also to redeem outstanding warrants.

The general fund, as reported by the ways and means committee, needs \$13,795. This will come from fines, licenses and a 4-5 mill levy.

Streets—\$7800, 3 mill levy.  
Library—\$1000, 2-5 mill levy.  
Lights—\$1500, 2-5 mill levy.  
Park and cemetery—\$2500, 1 mill levy.  
Sinking fund—\$500, 1-5 mill levy.

H. F. Lewis will superintend the construction of the Normal hill sewer at \$3.50 per day.

A grade for sidewalk was ordered established on the south side of First street.

Councilman Kjos desired the council to make a monthly donation for the support of the Lewiston band.

C. F. Allen of Clarkston asked for a ten year lease of 200 feet of the Snake river frontage, extending south from the bridge, to erect a warehouse. He expects to conduct a business in glass, paints, oils, etc. It was referred to the committee on streets.

The Northern Pacific, by its agent, W. J. Jordan, asked that its water bill be reduced from \$25 to \$20 per month, as the amount now consumed had been reduced by two large engines being transferred to the Moscow division.

Wheelmen must now use bells, cease coasting, attach lamps to their wheels and otherwise entertain a slight regard for the rights of pedestrians. They must not exceed six miles per hour when using the walks.

Councilman LaQuine asked for the appointment of a committee to confer with J. P. Vollmer as to securing the extension of Fifth street through his tract on Normal hill.

### County Exhibits for St. Louis.

Thomas Kirby will consummate his plans to have a separate exhibit at the St. Louis fair from Nez Perce and Idaho counties and Asotin county, Wash. He has received a communication from Mr. Henry Wax of Grangeville stating that the people of Idaho county will donate \$1000 to assist in making this tri county exhibit. If this offer can be duplicated in Nez Perce and Asotin counties the exhibit can be made. In the meantime Mr. Kirby is corresponding with the fair commissioners on the question of space in the Idaho building for the exhibition. This will be a grand display of the resources of the country adjacent to Lewiston, and the city ought not to miss the opportunity. The three counties can exhibit wonderful specimens of products of mine, field, orchard, garden and forest.

The Nez Perce county exhibit is stored at the Peck post office and in the Weisgerber cold storage. Mr. Kirby began early in the spring and has put in four months hard work securing fine specimens of our products. He has samples of early garden stuff and early fruit that cannot be produced at this time. Traveling men who have seen all the exhibitions ever held in the United States say when they have seen the exhibit of vegetables and fruit at Peck that they never have seen its duplicate.

A feature of the exhibit of Nez Perce county at the Lewiston fair will be a large white display board on which will be written in green grasses the names of different crops and the number of bushels per acre raised. At the foot of the board will be the actual soil in which the products are raised and the cereals growing as does in the fields. This will be transported to the St. Louis fair grounds if proper arrangements can be made.

### Normal Reception Friday Evening

The Christian societies of the city will give the Normal faculty and students a reception at the Presbyterian church Friday evening. This is the third reception given by the church societies to the Normal. Each of those in the past have been successful affairs and the young people of the town are making every effort to make this meeting surpass all previous efforts.

Rev. Guernsey will deliver an address of welcome and President Black of the school will respond on behalf of the faculty and students.

A pleasant, social time will be the order of the evening.

## COUNTY BOARD NAMES LEVY

Rate is Fixed at \$2.50, a Reduction from Last Year of Five Mills—Large Increase in Total Assessment over that of 1902—Comparative Statement of 1902-3.

The county commissioners, sitting yesterday as a board of equalization, fixed the county levy at \$2.50. Last year the levy was \$2.55. The assessment was increased \$1,246,600 over that for 1902, making an increase in the amount realized of \$28,804, being shown by the following tables in detail as prepared by County Treasurer C. A. Hastings:

\$9,143 of this amount will be realized outside the city of Lewiston by general school and district road levy. Lewiston will pay \$1.90 this year as against \$2.00 last. The roads and bridge fund is increased \$10,000, which will be used to take up floating warrants.

The board was in session until noon today, attending to routine matters.

County Attorney Johnson called the attention of the board to an article appearing in the Nezperce Herald of Sept. 10, in which he was belabored for an opinion on a smallpox nurse claim, which, he stated, he knew nothing about. He said he had never given the opinion alleged by the editor of the Herald, and asked that he be not quoted except as his official opinion was asked for and given. Mr. Johnson will correct the misapprehension, and when the bill is properly presented, it will be allowed by the board.

A large number of assignments of tax deeds were presented.

### State Assessment.

The assessed valuation of Idaho totals \$65,964,785.09. This is an increase over 1902 of \$4,673,909.73.

## VINELAND MEN BUY OPTIONS

Sixty Day Options Have Been Purchased, by Parties Connected with the Vineland Irrigation Company, of Two Thousand Acres Above their Ditch.

Real estate agents of Clarkston, closely connected with the Vineland Irrigation company have purchased in the last ten days sixty day options on 2000 acres of land laying above the Asotin ditch west of Vineland. It is evident that the men of Vineland will be doing something in a few days.

Last spring the chief engineer of the Vineland company came out from Boston and made the necessary surveys for a new ditch to be built entirely of cement and pipe to take the place of the old one. The work was completed about the middle of August and now these options have been bought by agents who are known to be connected with the Irrigation company. The following is a list of the lands on which the options have been purchased:

F. G. Morrison tract of 640 acres, contract price, \$20 per acre; Doege tract of 80 acres, contract price \$25 per acre; Rucker tract of 420 acres, contract price \$40 per acre; Kettenbach tract of 320 acres, contract price \$10 per acre; P. B. Allord tract of 160 acres, contract price \$1000.

The following were tendered an offer for their lands, but would not sell: J. E. Foster, \$18 per acre for 640 acres, and Mrs. A. M. Shaff, \$50 per acre for 320 acres.

### Mr. Waterman Talks.

H. H. Waterman, a prominent business man of Baker City, Oregon, has been in the city the last week visiting with Henry Nagle and family and incidentally looking into the condition of affairs around Lewiston. Mr. Waterman has had long experience in the financial world of the northwest but never had the privilege of visiting our city until this time.

He was very much surprised at the outlook for a splendid growth the city has at this time. Mr. Waterman has known that the location of Lewiston makes it a financial center for a large scope of country but did not realize that the city had the support of a vast country within the possibility of an immense irrigation system. He was very enthusiastic over the Waha water scheme. "The city of the west that has material support, a good location and plenty of semi-arid soil that can be made into orchard lands by cheap irrigation. It is the coming city of the section," said Mr. Waterman.

### Boy Fell From Horse.

SPALDING, Sept. 15—(Special.)—Clyde Fleming, the 8 year old son of A. W. Fleming, is suffering from a broken forearm. The boy was riding home from school yesterday behind his elder brother John when the horse reared up and threw him off. He fell upon his arm and broke the bones of the forearm about half way between the wrist and the elbow. Dr. Alley of the Indian school was called and set the fractured parts. This is the second time the arm has been broken at the same place.

Agent McArthur passed through town town Wednesday with seven Indian children for the Industrial school at Lapwai.

M. L. Goldsmith is on Craigs mountain making estimates on school lands.

The schools here are at work under the direction of Mrs. Ernest Wagner. The attendance averages about 26.

Joe Roch and Wm. Hughes are neither of them through harvesting but most of the farmers who have small fields had their threshing done before the rains began.

## WOODSIDE IS PROSPEROUS

Much Hay on the Mountain was Spoiled by the Early Rains—Grain is Not in Danger—Other Newsy Items from Woodside and Vicinity

WOODSIDE, Sept. 15.—(Special.)—A slight flurry of snow fell here Saturday night and six inches fell at the same time on Cottonwood and Mason buttes. Most of the hay has been cut and some of it was caught by the wet weather, but little damage will be done if the rain does not continue. Grain has not been cut and is therefore not in danger of being spoiled by the wet weather. Oats will average about 80 bushels to the acre and barley will produce from 60 to 70 bushels to the acre on Mason prairie and in the timber adjoining.

The people will dedicate the new dance hall—as soon as harvest is over—with a harvest ball. The hall is two stories high, 80 feet long by 60 feet wide. It has been built this summer by subscription.

George Frazier will build a store building this fall and instal a large stock of general merchandise. He will also put in a public scale.

The schools of the town will be out next Friday. An average of 40 pupils has attended for six months.

George Frazier has sold his farm to B. F. Weakley. The deal covered 160 acres and the sale price was \$3000.

Alex Marr has enlarged his store building, stock and residence. His stock, when it reaches the store from the wholesale houses will be worth \$3000.

### Mrs. Rodgers of Southwick Dead.

Mrs. E. S. Rodgers, a resident of Southwick, died Wednesday evening, Sept. 9th and was buried at the town cemetery.

Mrs. Rodgers has been ailing for some time with consumption but has been a patient sufferer through it all. Her early life was spent in Missouri, where she grew up to young womanhood. Her maiden name was Nelson and she was married at the age of seventeen to Mr. E. S. Rodgers.

The most of her married life was spent in Nebraska but two years ago the family came to Idaho thinking the change would be beneficial to her health. Her husband and four children, two sons and two daughters survive her. One of her daughters is married to Mr. Gordon Harris of Southwick. The funeral took place Thursday at Southwick, Rev. J. A. Hedges of this place officiating.—Kendrick Gazette.
