The development of the Hump district and other mining camps demand action on the part of the Lewiston business men. A special trade will come from the mining camps in the future and the business men should be prepared for the new conditions. It is a fault of Lewiston merchants that they never build up trade in advance. It has been the policy to follow rather than lead the demand. The city that has no competition can wait for all things to come by force of circumstances, but this condition is not present here at this time. There are growing camps which look to Lewiston for their supplies. However, there are few instances where they are dependent upon any one trade center. The Lewiston merchants could command for all time the trade of this whole district by energetic and aggressive efforts. The Hump trade is now going largely to Spokane, because the local dealers are not prepared to meet the special demands of a mining camp. This movement to an outside trade center will draw the trade of other camps unless special inducements are offered to attract people to this more natural point. The trade that is accommodated by the Clearwater road naturally belongs to Lewiston and can only be lost by neglected opportunities. The Snake river trade which promises to be as great as that of the Clearwater is also neglected. The people of that region are asking for roads and other transportation facilities, but they are disappointed from year to year till stores are being established at many points to meet the demands. This trade naturally belongs to Lewiston. It could be developed to equal the Clearwater trade. A boat line and wagon roads in that direction would do more to insure Lewiston rapid, permanent growth than any other

one enterprise at this time. The Snake river district by the expenditure of a sum equal to the money spent on roads to the Hump would bring to Lewiston more trade than will go to the Hump within a year, and, perhaps, for many years to come. An expenditure of ten thousand dollars to facilitate transportation to the south of Lewiston would open the richest country in this rich district. And this would be trade that could be held for all time.

The assertion is often made that perfect fruit cannot be grown by irrigation. This is invariably the opinion of those who do not understand the artificial use of water in fruit culture. It is a fact, however, that perfect fruit can be grown without fail in a good climate by the scientific use of water. Perfect crops can only be grown when the exact degree of moisture is maintained throughout the year. This important need can be assured only by irrigation. Therefore, logically perfect fruit can be grown uniformly only by irrigation. This is a fact that can not be controverted.

The prospectors are returning from the mountains with their usual tales of big fortunes, not quite in hand, but just far enough away to insure another grubstake next spring.
