## BIG DAY AT FAIR

Many Awards Made on

TODAY IS THE  
CLOSE OF FAIR

Attendance Yesterday was Large in  
Spite of the Rain—Result of  
Yesterday Races.

The rain yesterday interfered again  
with the attendance though regardless  
of the fact the total paid admissions reached  
3659.

The five days' attendance brought the  
total up to 18044 paid admissions.

Today is the closing day of the Lewiston  
Interstate fair, and the weather played  
in its favor. The sun shone brightly at  
an early hour and though a slight wind  
was blowing the day was not attended by  
any unpleasantness.

The fair association announced today  
that matinee races will be held every  
Saturday through the winter; this is a  
popular movement and will be well

## ENGLAND GERMANY

Alliance Between These  
Powers for Mutual Pro-  
tection in China.

AGAINST THE  
RUSSIAN EMPIRE

News as to How Russia Will Take  
It Awaited With World Wide  
Interest.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The German-Bri-  
tish alliance is undoubtedly directed  
against Russia and the reception of the  
news at St. Petersburg will hold the  
world's interest.

As to an intended step to be taken to  
protect their own interests in China,  
England and Germany will invite the  
powers, especially Austria, France, Italy,  
Japan, Russia, and the States to accept  
the principles of this agreement.

### TELEGRAPHIC FLASHES.

GALVESTON, Oct. 20.—In the past  
twelve hours fifty nine bodies have been  
taken from the hurricane debris. The  
relief committee reports one thousand  
persons receiving assistance daily and  
five thousand absolutely destitute.
