mills to work up the great timber resources, in irrigation projects to redeem the arid lands and with these has come the railroad, telegraph and telephone lines and other facilities that aid and encourage development.

The practical question for Idaho in this campaign is whether or not the state needs a change. No orator's shout of trust octopus can disguise the fact that Idaho has done well and promises to do better under present conditions. No amount of fine rhetoric can do away with the belief that the radical changes in commercial and industrial affairs that would be inaugurated by Mr. Bryan would bring about a period of doubt and distrust, during which time there would be a great reaction in the commercial life of the whole nation. Doubt and distrust are poor resources to draw upon to build railroads, dig irrigation canals, or open coal mines. The experience of the last four years shows that capital is not afraid to operate here under present conditions. Will the people of Idaho impose heavier penalties upon the operation of capital by helping to plunge the country into a new period, where the financial and industrial life of the country are to be changed radically under new policies? If this is done you can hardly blame the capitalist when he asks for time to test the new theories whose operation he now doubts. During this period of trial and probation improvements in Idaho would be at a standstill. Present progress would stop. Idaho will not invite such a change. The conservative judgment of the people will determine otherwise.

Mr. Bryan's Logic.
 I call upon you to witness, says Mr. Bryan, that the income of the apple-grower is less than the income of the trust magnate. You will see the necessity therefore, of voting for me for president.

It is assumed by Bryan that every man who owns a considerable property or does a considerable business is a "trust magnate." This argument is as convincing as anything Mr. Bryan has ever said. Its admirable adaptability lies in the fact that it puts the burden of proof on the other side. The man who proposes to vote for McKinley for president must show that the income of the poor apple-grower is larger than the income of the rich trust magnate. It will not do to say that a trust magnate blew his brains out in New York the other day because he was ruined and couldn't stand humiliation, or that President McKinley's apple crop netted him several hundred dollars.

No, the issue is far broader. It covers, in fact, the whole range of occupations, and involves on Mr. Bryan's part the position that the poor are not as well off as the rich. On that rock he stands and boldly defies all comers.

The man, therefore, who disputes Mr. Bryan's title to the presidency must be prepared to maintain that the bootblack receives a larger salary than the bank president, that a brakeman's pay is more than that of the general manager, that 30 cents is more than \$280, that a bird in the bush is worth two in the hand.

Statistics show that those who are in receipt of small incomes earn less money, on the average, than those who are in receipt of large incomes. Mr. Bryan claims the support every man who adheres to this view. All others he concedes to McKinley—Oregonian.

The action taken last night by two of Lewiston's enterprising citizens, who voluntarily asked to have the street improvements extended to cover new areas along

their property, is a commendable one and an action full of promise for the future of the city. This verifies the assertion often made in urging city improvements that if a start were once made the growth would come readily. There is ample proof at hand from the work already done that we have arrived at a successful solution of the street improvement question, and there is now a hopeful outlook that the improvement will be kept going continuously.
