Dubois Exposed.

Dubois is now confronted with his record on the free homes bill. It is a bit of senate history that Mr. Dubois was an enemy of the measure and did his best to throttle it. The people of Nez Perce county who are directly benefitted by the opening of the reservation know now where to place the blame for the defeat of the free homes bill in the Fifty-fourth congress. The opening of the reservation has made Nez Perce county take first rank in the state of Idaho. It was a measure of great benefit to the people of this county. Yet Mr. Dubois as United States senator deliberately turned it down. Senator Shoup on the contrary, was at all times a consistent friend of the free homes bill. He worked for it then and worked for it earnestly and devotedly. He kept on his work for the measure till success came in the last session of congress. These two men will be contestants before the legislature this winter for a seat in the United States senate. In choosing

candidates for the legislature on next Tuesday, the voters of Nez Perce county will vote indirectly either for Shoup or Dubois. A vote for the fusion legislative ticket is a vote for Dubois, the man who when he had an opportunity to do something for Nez Perce county, deliberately refused to lend a hand. Settlers on the reservation who are today enjoying free homes, and all beneficiaries of the bill, for every citizen of the county has been either directly or indirectly benefitted by free homes on the reservation, has a vote next Tuesday and the TELLER believes it will be given to reward the earnest efforts of Senator Shoup, who has been at all times a consistent friend of the one measure that more than any other has benefitted Nez Perce county.
