HON. WILLIS SWEET TALKS.

Says McKinley Will be Elected and is Confident he Will Carry Idaho.

Hon. Willis Sweet arrived in the city last night from South Idaho where he has campaigned for the past three weeks. Mr. Sweet speaks very confidently of the election of Wm. McKinley and is equally certain of his carrying the state of Idaho. Mr. Sweet left this morning for a tour of the Clearwater country. He will return here Saturday, speaking at the opera house in the evening.

From here he will proceed to Coeur d'Alene city where he will speak at noon next Monday and will enjoy the novelty of riding on a special engine from that place to Spokane in order to make connections so that he may speak at Moscow Monday night. In conversation with a TELLER reporter last night, Mr. Sweet said:

"I have just returned from a canvass in Owyhee, Lemhi, Custer, Canyon, Washington and Fremont counties. These are considered the strongholds of democracy in the state. In each of these counties a portion of the republican ticket will be elected and if any of them give majorities for Bryan they will be so small as to be easily overcome by one strong republican county. A month ago this state was conceded to Bryan. Ten days ago it was considered doubtful. Today the chances are more than equal in favor of the republican ticket. This comes from the fact that aggressive legislation necessary to develop a new state must come from the republican party as it always has, the people understand this and in view of the facts demonstrated by the development of the state they will not revert the national policy which is giving them the development and prosperity which nothing but wise, economic laws and generous legislation can produce.

Free Lecture.

Prof Leslie R. Mutch of California will give another lecture at the court house Friday evening under the auspices of the Teachers' Round Table. His subject this time will be "Wrong Influence as a Factor in Weakening the Moral and Mental Forces in Children." Those who have heard Prof. Mutch in his course of lectures along the lines of child culture and the effects of diet and climate on body and brain building will not fail to present Friday evening. These meetings should be mass meetings of parents, teachers and others interested in the question of the power of mind over the body and the body over the mind. The lectures are filled with hints of mental culture and health culture.

Mr. Abbott has been making a successful campaign canvass of Idaho drawing large and enthusiastic audiences. He has been selected by the Ada county people to close the campaign at Boise City. With Mr. Sweet and Mr. Abbott both Saturday Lewiston people are assured a rousing meeting.

Start Drilling Again.

The work of digging the hole on the Weisgerber property for the convenience of getting below the heavy gravel formation to sink conveniently an artesian well was completed this evening by Charles Dowd and John Speck. Mr. Dowd stated the hole was 24 feet deep and 12 feet wide and could not be sunk to any greater depth, owing to the fact that water had been struck. However, he considers that the well is in fair shape to begin using the boring machine and accordingly started work this afternoon. He anticipates there is no serious obstacle in the way of continuing the work until they learn definitely that an artesian well can be located and work will be prosecuted as rapidly as possible and continue until satisfactory results are obtained. In the course of digging the well nearly all the heavy boulders and pebbles are removed and there is now nothing that can interfere with the action of forcing the iron casing, which will be put through as the drills do the work. The enterprise shown by Mr. Weisgerber in demonstration either way the possibility of artesian wells is to be commended and the result is looked forward to with much interest.


