LEWISTON VICTORY

L. A. A. C. Football Team
Defeats the W. A. A. C.
Team

BY A SCORE
OF 11 TO 0

The Visitors Right Line was Weak
While the Home Team Went
Through Their Lines Easily.

The day was an ideal one in point of weather and the attendance at the L. A. A. C. Park to witness the football game between the Lewiston Amateur Athletic club team and the Walla Walla Amateur Athletic club team was large and enthusiastic the game being played in 20 minutes for the first half and 25 minutes in the second half, resulting in a score of 11 to 0 in favor of the home team.

The game was a very clever one and the best of feeling was displayed between both teams. The team work on both sides was not of the highest order but Lewiston showed a great improvement over the recent game with Pullman. Much praise is due Captain Bradley for his work in coaching the team and many ascribe the victory to his untiring efforts. For the visiting team Villa was easily the star but many of the team showed themselves to be thorough foot ball players. Their line needs strengthening on the right. Of the home team it can only be said that every man did his duty and did it well. The sensational run of the day was made by Coons. Cox, Roos, McFarland, Harrington, O. Kettenbach and Russell never failed to gain when called on.

The Lewiston eleven meets Spokane on their own grounds Saturday the 17th, a hard game is expected. The story of the game is as follows:

Lewiston won the toss, took the kick off and Walla Walla chooses the south goal. Roos kicked off to Lyons who returned it to the 20-yard line and was downed by McFarland, Villa made three attempts to gain through Lewiston's left tackle but lost the ball on downs.

Lewiston's ball on Walla Walla's 20-yard line, McFarland made five yards around Walla Walla's left end and Lewiston advanced the ball two yards more on two down, third down three yards to gain, Kettenbach makes the yardage. Cox advanced the ball two yards more. Harrington went through Walla Walla's right tackle for a touch down. McFarland failed to kick the goal. Score: Lewiston 5; Walla Walla 0.

Walla Walla kicks to Captain Bradley on the 10-yard line, who advanced the ball 20 yards. Lewiston failed to make the yardage. It was the visitors ball on downs. Norris took the ball, but lost 10 yards. McFarland broke through the line and downed the runner for a loss of five yards. Norris made a 20-yard run around Lewiston's left end. In the next two downs they failed to gain and time was called with Walla Walla in possession of the ball on Lewiston's 15-yard line. Score: 5 to 0 in favor of Lewiston.

There was 10 minutes' intermission and at Walla Walla's request W. L. Thompson was substituted for F. Roos as umpire.

Walla Walla's kick off, with Lewiston defending the south goal. Norris kicked off to Bradley, who advanced the ball 20 yards. Cox gained four yards through Walla Walla's left guard. Coon broke through Walla Walla's right tackle, with a splendid interference and made a 45-yard run and was downed on Walla Walla's 20-yard line. The next two downs were but small gains and Roos made a 15-yard gain through Walla Walla's right tackle. Coon made a small gain. McFarland bucked center for a touch down. Roos kicked the goal. Score: 11 to 0 in favor of Lewiston.

Walla Walla kicked off to Cox, who advanced the ball 20 yards. Coon made to

yards through tackle. Coxed buck center for three yards. McFarland advanced five yards. Next two downs the ball was advanced four yards. Cox made five yards through center. Roos advanced the ball 6 yards through tackle. Russel made eight yards through center, but was brought back on off side play. Cox makes five yards, and Harrington three yards. Lewiston fumbled, but ball was regained by Cox. Lewiston failed to gain, Walla Walla's ball on downs.

Walla Walla made three attempts to gain but were stopped for a loss. Lewiston made a few gains but lost the ball on downs, Walla Walla's ball. Norris then made a splendid run of 15 yards. The next three downs they failed to gain and the ball went to Lewiston. Harrington advanced the ball 10 yards. Here Loubinger took Buchet's place at right half. Cox and McFarland took the ball for a five yards gain. Kettenbach made 4 yards, Roos 3 yards Lewiston failed to gain Walla Walla's ball. Walla Walla failed to gain twice. Norris made a splendid punt, Cox returned the ball a few yards and was downed. Lewiston made some gains but fumbled the ball, Walla Walla man got the fumble. Visitors failed to gain and punted. This time Capt. Norris made a commendable play by rushing forward and putting his own men on side and Walla Walla regained the ball on her own punt. Walla Walla lost the ball on downs through a series of bucks. Lewiston advanced the ball to Walla Walla's 15 yard line when time was called. score favor of Lewiston 11 to 0.

Capt. Norris, of the visitors, made an excellent run of 30 yards.

Crimson and gold and the "rooters" were out in full force yesterday.

Lyons punt of 25 yards for Walla Walla, and their regaining the pigskin again, showed the only weakness of the home team.

McFarland played the whole line, doing effective work. He thoroughly knows the game.

Fred Cox showed Walla Walla how to leap the lines.

NOT SAFE AT HOME

Bryan Finds Nebraska in
Doubt and Devotes To-
day to Final Round-Up

ROOSEVELT RESTS
AT OYSTER BAY

Will Talk to His Neighbors This
Evening — Republicans Confi-
dently Await Tomorrow.

FAIRMOUNT, Neb., Nov. 5.—Bryan left Lincoln this morning for a final series of speeches of the campaign and his trip will be through the section of the state considered extremely close politically. His first stop was at Exeter where he addressed eight thousand people charging that the trust iniquity was brought on by republican rule and denying that Nebraska is prosperous and reading figures by state labor commissioners in the state had increased one hundred and forty nine million dollars during the past four years. Four thousand people welcomed him at Fairmount. Other points to be touched are Harvard, Minden, Halbridge, Wilcox, Hastings, Aurora, York and Seward returning to Lincoln at six this evening and speaking in the square. He will then leave for Omaha where he makes six speeches tonight. Bryan is very hopeful of victory tomorrow.

OYSTER BAY, L. I. Nov. 5.—Roosevelt will remain at home today, resting. Tonight he will deliver his last speech of the campaign to the people of his home town. Special trains will bring marching clubs from New York to participate in the demonstration. Tomorrow evening he will receive the returns at his residence on Sagamore Hill.

Tagals Sue for Peace.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The war de-
partment today received a letter from
President Taft of the Philippine commis-
sion, forwarding a statement signed by
Bucamano, secretary of state to Auguin-
aldo's cabinet, and by a number of others
formerly active in the insurrection, to the
effect that the Filipinos are ready to ac-
cept the sovereignty of the United States
and pray for its protection. The signers
represent the desirability of stopping the
war and offer to organize a native revolt
against Aguinaldo. The department
while appreciating the importance of the
letter as a campaign document, refused to
make it public today, though they may
possibly do so tomorrow.

Senator Davis Ill.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 5.—Senator Davis' con-
dition today is critical. A consultation
of physicians will be held this evening.

An English Opinion.

LONDON, Nov. 5.—The St. James
Gazette today in summing up the general
English opinion on the American election
says:

"Bryan will not be elected and that
McKinley's imperialism, which happens
to jump with the British nations' inter-
ests, will make his return particularly
acceptable to Englishmen."

Valuable Court Decision.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—In the
United States circuit court this morning
it was decided that an insurance policy
having a cash surrender value exempt
from execution in any state passed to the
trustees of the bankrupt unless bankrupt
secured to the trustee such cash. The
surrender value policies passed to the
heirs do not become assets.

Money Tightens.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Money rates ad-
vanced steadily this morning and at
eleven o'clock the rate was fifteen per
cent. Tightness conceded to be due to
election.

Five to One.
