It is conceded even by democratic partisans that the development of the administration policy in the Philippines will add materially to the commercial importance of the Pacific northwest. In all this development Idaho has a very important place, yet Idaho alone of all these states has turned down the administration and will send a congressman and senator to Washington who will be in all things at variance with the party in power. Idaho at a time when her needs are greatest has not a friend in court in touch with the national administration. Her entire representation in congress after March next will be men pledged to thwart the administration in every movement made to further its policies, men whose political affiliations are with parties so greatly in the minority as to be totally powerless to effect any legislation that will benefit Idaho. Fusion success at the polls has sidetracked Idaho's interests at the national capital at a time when a strong representation there in touch with the party of supremacy would materially benefit the state. There will be many times in the next two years when the people of the state will have occasion to regret the short-sighted policy which triumphed in the fusion victory.

It is a little more than a month now till the state legislature meets. The outlook is that the paramount issue will be the election of a United States senator, but aside from that there are some measures of interest that will directly effect Lewiston and Nez Perce county and the party in power should be charged with the responsibility of accomplishing something for the people. To this end, that the greatest good for the greatest number may be accomplished, the TELLER will be pleased to open its columns to any one who has a measure or measures to be presented that questions of importance and material benefit may not be overlooked in the double shuffle of a hot senatorial contest. During the canvass which led to the recent election no issue of local importance was presented by the various legislative candidates, the senatorial fight was made paramount. But the citizens of Lewiston and the county have claims upon the representatives, even above the claims of the politicians who will lobby the senatorial fight and it would be business sagacity to begin now, a campaign on local issues made paramount by our necessities.

In fusion politics it has always fallen to the populists to hold the balance of power. This year is no exception. The nine populist votes in the legislature are complete masters of the senatorial fight. If the fusion compact holds Dubois has only 33 votes, three short of election. If he wins out it must be by the populist votes. But the fusion compact will not hold. Dubois will not enter the senatorial race in January with the strength Senator Shoup will, nor does he represent elements likely to rally to his support. The best analysis of the situation is a long fight: a new man, Shoup or a dead lock.

Fusion, as a party policy, has been chased into the hills. Three states in the Rocky mountains are

all that is left to do reverence to the movement which four years ago cut a wide swath in politics. In Idaho, Montana and Colorado the office trust still holds sway, but the end is inevitable. Disintegration and degeneracy will mark the final taking off of fusion. One more legislative session of wrangle and discord, another sensational fight with the venom of disappointment and the fusion fusee will never be lighted in Idaho again.
