Burlington Wages Raised.

A Burlington man has a few prosperity figures to offer. Nearly a year ago a new scale of pay for switchmen was made effective. Before it went into effect day switchmen, who worked thirty one days in the month received \$61.57 for their labor. Now they receive \$80.48. Under the old scale night switchmen received \$71.54 while they now receive \$86.44. Day foremen received \$77.50, but they now get \$89.42, while the night foreman received under the old scale \$83.46. They now receive \$95.36. The aggregate amount paid out to laborers in the Lincoln yards this month will greatly exceed the amount paid out one year ago.—Nebraska State Journal.


