County Assessor Staas Spekker reports that county taxes are being collected now at the average of \$250 to \$300 per day. One day last week netted \$1400.

White Bros. are loading a car load of apples here today for shipment to Kansas City. They are also loading cars today at St. Johns, Juliaetta and Oakesdale for shipment to Denver, Great Falls and Kalispell.

The steamer Spokane made a record breaking trip to Waha landing yesterday afternoon. She left the wharf here at 3 p. m., made the run to Waha, loaded 1000 sacks of wheat and was back at the Lewiston landing at 6:45 p. m.

Major W. F. Allison and his brother A. C. Allison of Brookings, South Dakota, are stopping in Clarkston on a tour of the west for the purpose of seeking a permanent location. Major Allison was in command of the First South Dakota regiment in the Philippine.

The first bank notes issued by the Idaho National bank were signed today and have been passed over the counter in the business transactions of the day. They bear the name of W. P. Hurlbut, president, or G. W. Thompson, vice president, and F. M. Hinkly, cashier.

Work on the subgrade of the new street extension is practically complete. All the men and teams employed in moving the material to make the fill were laid off at 3 o'clock. The roller is now being used to pack the gravel to receive the macadam. Work will begin tomorrow on the curbing.

The Redmen of Lewiston and Asotin had a social and supper at their lodge room last night. The members of Tece-minium tribe, No. 8, entertained about 25 members of the Stootki tribe. The preliminaries included an initiation ceremony and the subsequent proceedings included high jinks and a turkey supper.

The Clearwater train is not running into Stites today. It failed to make the trip yesterday because of a big landslide just above Stuart. The railroad company has a large force of men at work clearing away the debris and expect to have the road opened in about three days. The passengers and mail enroute are now transferred at Stuart.

Edson Briggs returned yesterday from a trip to Lapwai where he made the survey and started the work on a new county bridge. The new bridge will be located just above the mouth of Tom Bell creek. The people of that section are so eager to have it completed and have easy access to Lewiston that they have contributed the work, the county paying only for the lumber.

Yesterday at the land office an adverse claim was filed by the Buffalo Orphan Belle Gold Mining Co., against the application for patent made by the Buffalo Hump Syndicate for the Ridge and Dead Tree mining claims in the Robbins Mining district. The adverse was rejected at the local office for the reason that the same was not filed within the required 60 days after publication, the said 60 days having expired on December 4th.

**A Modern Hotel.**

Dennis Holland, proprietor of the Hotel de France, began work today clearing up the lot south of the hotel for the erection of a new brick and stone building. This building will be used as a supplemental rooming apartment for the hotel. The building projected will be 70x100 feet, three stories with a basement.

The building will be heated by a furnace and furnished with electric lights. Suites of rooms will be arranged and fitted with every modern convenience. The building will be of stone and brick and will have 50 rooms. This is the first step in Mr. Holland's ultimate plan of covering the entire corner with a modern hotel building.
