THEY WANT PEACE

Filipinos Organize Saying "The Time for Peace has Come."

HAVE AMBITION TO ENTER THE UNION

They Hope to Organize Under the American Constitution as States of the Union.

MANILA, Dec. 26.—The federal party has decided upon a new organization and today published in the Spanish and Filipino evening papers an address to the Filipinos.

"The number of Filipinos who are convinced that the time for peace has come increases daily," says the address. "The object of the federal party is the reunion of all Filipinos who truly wish for peace and are disposed to work for it."

It appeals to those who will attempt to attain for the Philippines the greatest number of liberties under the application of the American constitution.

"We call ourselves the federal party because, under American sovereignty, the righteous aspirations of the Philippines will be to form a party to the American federation as states of the union."

The executive committee has cabled President McKinley, announcing that the organization has been perfected and tendering an expression of good will.

Copies of the addresses have been sent into the provinces. The paragraph declaring for American recognition of the legality of some of the acts of the authorities of the insurgent government, is in confirmation with precedents established during the reconstruction period following the civil war in the United States.

Advices to the Associated Press from the island of Leyte show that there is still considerable turmoil on the west coast, but that the east coast is quiet, the leaders having retired to the mountains. Lieutenant Frank E. Lynch and three men of the Forty-fourth volunteer infantry were wounded near Ilongos, on the west coast. Two men of Company L, Forty-third volunteer infantry, were killed, and three of Company L and F together with Lieutenant Lewis Leaf were wounded December 13 near San Miguel, northwestern Leyte.

No decided results have yet been secured by the 2000 United States troops distributed among the coast towns of Samar.

Tennessee Cigarette Law.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—Legislators in several states are preparing to make efforts to pass a law similar to that of Tennessee in regard to cigarettes as soon as the opinion of the United States Supreme court is printed. Several governors of states have asked for copies of the decision.

A Grand Ball.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25.—Mrs. Leiter will give a grand ball at her palatial residence in Dupont Circle tonight. The magnificent ballroom has recently been thoroughly renovated, many curios from the Orient having been added to its decorations. Washingtonians expect that this will be one of the grandest balls ever witnessed here. This entertainment will be the first of a series which the Leiters will give this winter. A grand hunt ball is to be given the first week of January. The Chevy Chase Hunt club will attend and there will be English and New York guests.

Making Journalists.

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Arrangements were made at a meeting today to extend the work of the American Journalists Writers Institute of New York throughout the country. This institute teaches the mysteries and serious side of journal-

ism and magazine writing, preparing bright minds for a literary career. Young writers and journalists as well as students are taught the most advanced methods of handling news, and short stories, their duty to the public and how to respect the laws of libel. All writing of this age, whether it be for newspapers or magazines, is directed toward the uplifting of humanity.

Harmsworth Here.

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Mr. Alfred Harmsworth, proprietor of the Daily Mail and other papers of London, who has arrived in this country says he is here for holiday, pure and simple, and his visit has nothing to do with establishing a "Daily Mail" in New York.

Cashed Today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26.—The treasury is anticipating the payment of interest on bonds due January 1. This includes the 4 per cents of 1909 and the new 2 per cent consols of 1930. The total interest payment is \$5,250,000. Coupons were cashed today at all subtreasuries, and interest checks will be cashed on the 30th inst.

Maine Pedagogues.

LEWISTON, Dec. 26.—The Maine Pedagogical Association is in annual session in the Dingley Training School building. The departments of superintendents, grammar schools, secondary schools, primary schools and rural schools will present programmes, so that the exercises will be of a varied and comprehensive character.

Holiday Conference.

SYRACUSE, Dec. 26.—The Associated Academic Principals of the Empire State are in session here discussing the interests of high schools and academies, the conference being composed of secondary teachers. Colleges and normal schools are, however, represented by numerous delegates. The conference will last until the 28th.

Teachers' Meeting.

SALT LAKE, Dec. 26.—The Utah State Teachers' Association will begin tonight its annual meeting of four days at Assembly hall, where addresses of welcome will be delivered by Brigham S. Young and Mrs. Igleheart, of Salt Lake. Responses will be made by Supt. Christensen, Saupete county, and Nephi Anderson, superintendent of schools of Box Elder county. The president, Oscar Van Cott, will deliver his annual address. The discussions during the meeting will be upon interesting topics of a practical character.

Grain Shipments.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 26.—A new departure in the shipment of grain to Europe is by the way of the Orient. The British steamship Glenturret will load on Puget Sound and go to Europe by way of the Orient and the Suez Canal. This is the first shipment ever made by that route. The Glenturret will make regular trips, and will touch at Yokohama, Kobe, Hong Kong, Manila, Singapore and Colombo. The steamers will unload and load at each of these ports, as there is considerable local traffic between them.

United States Rubber.

NEW YORK, Dec. 26.—Officials of the United States rubber company make no secret of the fact that the independents are underselling them in the trade, and in trade circles it was believed that the independents, on account of their small capitalization, could sell goods at a price to meet which the United States company would be obliged to adopt a basis which would exclude the probability of dividends on the common stock and might even impair those upon the preferred. It is claimed that the company will make a large cut in prices.

Heavy Immigration.

PORTLAND, Dec. 26.—The immigration of homeseekers to the Northwest is now very large. The homeseekers' rate on the railroads is now bearing fruit in crowded cars and long trains. Many farmers who came to Oregon last year and saw the bountiful crops harvested beneath a kindly sun that never made the farm hands uncomfortable, were favorably impressed with the state, and so went back resolved to arrange their affairs and give the coast a genuine trial. Many of these homeseekers are now in Portland, and the hotels are crowded. They come principally from the Dakotas, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Kansas, and many from the Mississippi Valley, and are mostly farmers.

BRYAN WILL TALK

His Fiest Public Speech Since His Second Defeat.]

WILL ANSWER CLEVELAND

At the Annual Banquet on Jackson's Day in Chicago. A Large Attendance Predicted.

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—The Chronicle says: William Jennings Bryan will answer ex-President Cleveland's criticism of the democratic party at the annual banquet of the W. J. Bryan league of Chicago on the anniversary of the battle of New Orleans, January 8th. The affair will take place at the Sherman house. It will be Bryan's first public speech since his second defeat for the presidency. Announcement was made last evening at the meeting of the county democracy by Robert E. Burke of the acceptance by Mr. Bryan of an invitation to speak on Jackson day. Mr. Bryan's subject is "Democracy."

Besides Bryan, the other speakers who have accepted are ex-Governor William J. Stone, of Missouri, Congressman Carmack, of Tennessee, and Mr. Burke says it is probable that Governor Beckham of Kentucky, will be the fourth orator
