Early Real Estate Values.

James Conley tells a good story concerning early real estate values in Lewiston valley. In 1873 C. A. Thatcher owned 40 acres, taking in the land where the court house now stands and the Poe orchard tract. He owned also land on the hill now known as Thatcher place, and had besides an orchard and garden plot where the old home stands. He was a business man and needed help to tend his farm, garden, and orchard. Farm help was scarce, as the mining craze held all the transients who cared to labor, but finally Mr. Thatcher hired one, Frank McKern to sow the Thatcher place to rye and look after the garden and orchard and agree to give him for a year wages the 40 acres above mentioned. McKern consented with the provision that he be allowed extra time to cultivate and seed his new 40 acres. He got in his crop alright but the summer was extry dry and all the rye on the 40 acres burned to nothing. The crop failure disheartened McKern from becoming a land owner in Lewiston and he threw up his contract and donated his four and a half months wages to Mr. Thatcher and forfeited his claim to the land.
