Why Not?

"Why not supply the local demand for home productions?" is the pointed inquiry made by one of the speakers at a dairy meeting held in one of the Palouse towns last week. The lesson will apply to local conditions here as well. The farmers are overlooking the needs of their home market. Lewiston merchants have to import bacon, butter and eggs from the east to supply the demands of their customers many of whom are farmers. With eggs at 40 cents a dozen and butter at 35 cents per pound in the home market, the margin of profit ought to be large enough to stimulate home industry along these lines. The wheat in the granary is a slow moving product, but the dairy cow and the poultry yard could be doing an active business under the present demands of the local market. "Why not supply the local demand for home productions?"
