THE NEW CONSCRIPTION BILL.—By the amendment of the conscription bill, as proposed by Senator Wilson, in the Senate, the following persons are exempt: Such as are mentally or physically unfit for military duty; the Vice President, Judges of Courts. Gov-ernors of States, heads of Executive Departments; the only son of a widow, wholly de-pendent on him for support; the only son of aged or infirm parents wholly dependent on him for support, and in case all are drafted of several sons, the parent or parents may select which shall be exempt; the only brother of orphan children under 12 years ald; where two sons have deceased or been disabled in military service the residue shall be exempt. The division into classes in the enrollment is abolished. Substitutes for persons enrolled exempts such persons.
